

## **Compliance action taken for childcare provision**

### **Summary of outcome**

All early years providers must meet the legal requirements in the Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage, which you can find at [www.gov.uk/government/publications/early-years-foundation-stage-framework--2](http://www.gov.uk/government/publications/early-years-foundation-stage-framework--2). If we find that a provider is not meeting the requirements, we can take action to ensure they put matters right.

On 8 July 2022, we carried out an inspection and found the provider was not meeting some of these requirements.

The report and inspection outcome will be published in due course. Following the inspection, we served a welfare requirements notice on 4 August 2022. This is a legal notice that requires the provider to take the actions below within the timescales set out. The provider will be able to give parents further information about this.

Actions needed by 15 August 2022.

- extend knowledge and understanding of safeguarding, including prevent duty and the procedures to follow in the event of a concern about a child or if an allegation is made
- ensure information is gained about children's dietary requirements prior to children starting at the setting
- maintain an accurate daily record of children being cared for on the premises and their hours of attendance.
- provide a regular two-way flow of information with parents and between other settings that children attend
- provide daily opportunities for children to access the outdoors.

On 19 of August 2022, we carried out a regulatory visit. The focus of the visit was to check whether the provider had met the safeguarding and welfare actions, raised at their last inspection.

We found that the provider had improved their knowledge and understanding of child protection procedures and now fully understands their responsibilities. Details of children's dietary requirements are now obtained prior to a child starting at the setting and the provider had maintained accurate records of children attendance. In addition, the provider

demonstrated a good understanding of how to establish a regular two-way flow of information with parents and other settings a child may attend. The provider regularly takes children to the park or uses her garden to enable them to have daily opportunities to access outdoor provision.

We are satisfied the provider has met the safeguarding and welfare actions raised. The provider is still registered with Ofsted.
