Monitoring visit

Information about this children's home

A private provider owns and manages this home. The home provides care for up to five children who may have emotional and/or social difficulties.

The home does not have a registered manager. A manager was appointed on 27 June 2022.

During a monitoring visit on 14 February 2022, inspectors found several regulatory breaches in the management and leadership arrangements. These shortfalls impacted on the children's safety, protection and welfare. In response, Ofsted issued a compliance notice under regulation 13.

The provider made the decision to temporarily close the home on 18 February 2022. As such, Ofsted issued a notice of proposal to impose the three-month condition on the provider's registration. This means that the provider must give Ofsted three-month's notice of their intention to admit any child into the home.

A monitoring visit was carried out on 12 May 2022 to monitor the provider's response to the compliance notice. The home was closed. Therefore, Ofsted reissued the compliance notice under regulation 13.

This monitoring visit

The home remains closed and there are no children living in the home.

This visit was carried out to monitor the provider's response to the compliance notice. During this visit, the inspectors identified that one of the five steps identified in the compliance notice had been met. A new manager has been appointed. However, this person has yet to submit their application to register with Ofsted.



Four members of staff have been appointed. Some staff have commenced the induction process and mandatory training. A recruitment campaign is ongoing as the current staffing levels are insufficient to reopen the home. Therefore, this step of the compliance notice has been reissued.

As the home remains closed, the provider has been unable to demonstrate that they have sufficient staff who are suitably trained to care for children. As a result of this, the provider has been unable to provide accurate and up-to-date rotas, and demonstrate that their staff will receive supervision as identified in their policy. As such, these steps of the compliance notice have been reissued under regulation 13.

The provider has taken action to improve the home's condition. A full refurbishment is underway. Rooms are being repainted, a new kitchen has been installed and repairs to the exterior are being addressed.

The eight further requirements and the two recommendations made following the monitoring visit in February 2022 have also been reissued.

During this monitoring visit, the provider notified Ofsted of their intention to reopen the home.

Statutory Requirements

understand the impact that the quality of care provided in the home is having on the progress and experiences of each child and use this understanding to inform the development of the quality of care provided in the home. (Regulation 13 (1)(a)(b) (2)(f))

The registered person must maintain records ("case records") for each child which—	16 October 2022
include the information and documents listed in Schedule 3 in relation to each child;	
are kept up to date; and	
are signed and dated by the author of each entry. (Regulation 36 (1)(a)(b)(c))	
This requirement was made at the monitoring visit on 14 February 2022 and is restated.	
Schedule 4 sets out the other information that the registered person must keep in relation to a children's home.	16 October 2022
The registered person must—	
maintain in the home the records in Schedule 4. (Regulation 37 (1) (2)(a))	
This requirement was made at the monitoring visit on 14 February 2022 and is restated.	
The registered person must ensure that a record is made of any complaint, the action taken in response, and the outcome of any investigation.	16 October 2022
The registered person must ensure that no child is subject to any reprisal for making a complaint or representation. (Regulation 39 (3) (4))	
This requirement was made at the monitoring visit on 14 February 2022 and is restated.	



The registered person must notify HMCI and each other relevant person without delay if—	16 October 2022
a child is involved in or subject to, or is suspected of being involved in or subject to, sexual exploitation;	
an incident requiring police involvement occurs in relation to a child which the registered person considers to be serious;	
there is an allegation of abuse against the home or a person working there;	
there is any other incident relating to a child which the registered person considers to be serious. (Regulation 40 (4)(a)(b)(c)(e))	
This requirement was made at the monitoring visit on 14 February 2022 and is restated.

Recommendations

- The registered person should ensure that there is a nurturing and supportive environment that meets the needs of the children. Children's homes must comply with relevant health and safety legislations (alarms, food hygiene etc.). Rooms and outside areas need to be decorated and maintained to ensure that the home remains warm and welcoming and is not institutionalised. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 15, paragraph 3.9)
- The registered person should ensure that staff are familiar with the home's policies on record-keeping and understand the importance of careful, objective and clear recording. Staff should record information on individual children in a non-stigmatising way that distinguishes between fact, opinion and third-party information. Information about the child must always be recorded in a way that will be helpful to the child. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 62, paragraph 14.4)
