The quality and T standards of early in years provision

What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision does not meet requirements

Children's safety is compromised. Although children feel safe and secure within the setting, their well-being and safety is put at risk. This is because staff lack critical knowledge and understanding of safeguarding policy and procedures. Despite this, children form good relationships with the staff team. Some staff are attentive to the needs of the younger children and recognise when they may need a little help and encouragement to join in an activity.

Children behave well and listen to the staff, following instructions about what group they are in and where they will do their activities. They enjoy a range of outdoor sport activities along with indoor arts and crafts. Children benefit from three large outdoor areas where they can participate in activities such as football, tennis, and obstacle courses. Younger children grow confidence in their abilities as they tackle the obstacle course and succeed to the end. Older children offer a helping hand to younger children and encourage them to join in their games.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Leaders do not know and fulfil their responsibilities regarding the safe recruitment of staff. For example, the recruitment process is inconsistent and appropriate checks are not completed prior to staff starting work. This poses a risk to children as the suitability of staff is not assured. The leadership team acknowledges the weakness in its processes but failed to put effective strategies in place to mitigate risk to children.
- Staff are not adequately trained to always ensure the safety of children. Induction processes are not effective in training the staff team in how to manage safeguarding concerns. For example, staff do not know the procedure to follow should an allegation be made against a member of staff and how to report it to local safeguarding agencies. They do not receive regular supervision and support from leaders. Furthermore, there are insufficient staff who hold valid first-aid certificates to ensure someone can respond quickly to in an emergency.
- Children behave well. They show respect to each other and wait patiently to take their turn in a group activity. They cheer each other on and celebrate the success of their friends. For example, when playing penalty shootout, they cheer with delight when a friend scores a goal.
- Children separate into age groups and rotate around the various activities with their leaders. They enjoy the variety and engage well in what is on offer for them. However, resources are limited. This means children wait for long periods of time before they can take their turn and share the resources available to them.



- Some staff are attentive to the needs of the children. They recognise when a child may need a cuddle and some support to join in an activity. These staff observe the children at play and act swiftly to ensure all children feel included. They adapt their approach to meet the interests and needs of the children.
- Children generally respond well to the staff caring for them. However, many of the children do not know the names of the adults looking after them and so refer to them as 'teacher'. This highlights the inconsistency of staffing on a day-to-day basis. This hinders children's ability to build bonds and get to know and develop positive relationships with their carers.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

The provider fails to implement robust recruitment processes to ensure children's welfare and safety while at the holiday club. Staff lack basic knowledge and understanding of their duty of care to protect children from risk of harm. They are unclear of the procedures to follow should an allegation be made against a member of staff or how to refer to local safeguarding agencies. Leaders have not ensured staff are adequately trained to recognise signs and indicators of abuse and how to report any concerns. The designated safeguarding lead has not received training to fulfil the role effectively.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is not meeting requirements and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.
