The quality and standards of early years provision

What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision does not meet requirements

Leaders do not consistently implement robust recruitment procedures to ensure staff are suitable for their role. This compromises children's safety and well-being. Despite this, children enjoy their time at the setting. They make good relationships with staff. Younger children receive the support and encouragement they need to join in with activities.

Children behave well and listen to the staff. They follow instructions well and understand the daily routine. They enjoy outdoor sport activities. For example, they play a ball game where children learn to be team players and work together to succeed in scoring goals. Children benefit from a large outdoor area where they can participate in many activities. They are excited when they notice some wildlife. For example, they observe a wood pigeon in its nest in the tree and talk about how many eggs or maybe even chicks it may have in the nest. Younger children grow confident in their abilities as they learn to make paper aeroplanes. They solve problems, such as folding the paper successfully so that the aeroplane will fly high.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Leaders do not do enough to make sure they fulfil their responsibilities regarding the safe recruitment of staff. For example, the recruitment process is inconsistent and appropriate checks are not always completed for all staff. This poses a risk to children, as the suitability of staff is not assured. The leadership team acknowledges the weakness in these processes.
- Leaders do not offer effective staff supervision to support staff, help evaluate practice and review staff skills and knowledge. This impacts on staff's professional development and their understanding of their roles and responsibilities in caring for children.
- The arrangements for staff training and induction are not effective. Staff complete some training. However, leaders do not ensure that staff understand what they have learned or check that they are confident about the policies and procedures for the setting. This affects how consistently procedures are implemented in practice.
- Children enjoy spending time in their age groups and moving around the various activities with their leaders. They eagerly take part in a variety of sports and art and craft activities. Children respond well to the staff caring for them. They are given named stickers at the start of the day and staff introduce themselves so that the staff and children all know who everyone is. This helps staff identify the children in their groups, particularly if the children are new to the camp.
- Staff observe the children at play and act swiftly to ensure all children feel included. For example, some older children are reluctant to run around during



the ball game, and they are given the option to be the goalkeepers in the hoop, so that they can still participate. Staff are attentive to the needs of the children and recognise when they need some extra support. They adapt their approach to meet the interests and needs of the children.

■ Children behave very well. They enjoy team games together and cheer each other on, celebrating the success of their friends. For example, when children are playing a ball game and their teammate scores a goal, the whole team cheer and jump for joy.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Children's safety is not assured due to weaknesses in the recruitment process. Nonetheless, leaders and staff complete regular risk assessments and supervise children well to keep them safe. They have a suitable understanding of the signs and indicators of child abuse and wider safeguarding matters. This includes county lines and female genital mutilation as well as keeping children safe online. They know the procedures to follow, should they have any concerns, to help protect children from harm and how to report to local safeguarding partners in the event of an allegation being made against a member of staff.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:
