What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

Children's care needs are not always met. At times, there are too few staff available to care for children. Children are exposed to hazards and are put at risk in the event of an emergency. Furthermore, children are not always supported to learn at the rate at which they are capable. The supervision arrangements in place for staff do not ensure high-quality teaching is maintained for all children. Younger children are not consistently provided with opportunities to develop their physical skills.

Children share books with staff. They handle books with care and are developing a love of reading. Children hear new vocabulary, such as the word 'rhinoceros'. They confidently repeat phrases from the story that is being read to them. This helps their communication and language development. However, systems in place to share information about care and learning with parents are not fully effective. Some parents do not receive information promptly enough about what activities their child has taken part in or how much food they have eaten during the day.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The provider does not ensure that staffing arrangements are managed in a way that ensures ratio requirements are met at all times. The management team has not fully considered what should happen in the event of staff absences or lateness. Some children arrive at the setting upset. Staff cannot give these children the attention that they need to meet their emotional needs because there are too many other children to care for.
- The management team has not made sure that staff thoroughly risk assess all areas of the nursery. Cleaning chemicals are left in the children's toilet where children could reach them. Because of broken safety locks, children access cupboards in their play environment that they should not be able to. These cupboards contain hazards that pose a risk to children, such as nappy bags.
- The setting has been operating without a food business registration, which does not comply with health and safety legislation. While this has now been rectified, the kitchen where children's meals are prepared still lacks essential equipment to ensure good hygiene practices. For example, the cook does not have access to a handwashing sink or paper towels for drying their hands.
- Fire safety measures are compromised. Staff who do not usually work at the nursery have not had a thorough induction. They are unfamiliar with the fire evacuation procedure and do not know where the assembly points are. Furthermore, at times, there are obstructions to some fire exits. This would hamper the quick and safe evacuation of children and staff in the event of an emergency.
- Some of the more experienced members of staff demonstrate their ability to



- extend children's learning and development. However, not all children experience the same quality of teaching. As a result, some children do not engage in their learning. The manager has established some support and coaching systems to improve staff practice, but these are not yet fully effective.
- Staff recognise that younger children are quickly progressing in their physical development. They provide opportunities for these children to practise their gross motor skills outside, but not inside. As a result, children's behaviour deteriorates as they look for physical challenge. They climb on tables and step up and down on their toys.
- The provider has not made sure that systems in place to enable a two-way flow of information between staff and parents work. Some parents report a delay in receiving information about their child's care and learning. On occasion, parents have to ask for such information rather than it being readily provided to them by staff.
- Staff express their enthusiasm for working at the nursery. The senior management team supports staff well-being through team meetings and regular visits. This promotes a positive team morale and creates a happy place for children to be.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Children are put at risk because they are exposed to risks and hazards in their environment. Not all staff are confident about what to do in an emergency. The manager does not organise staffing arrangements well enough to ensure ratio requirements are always adhered to. This means children are not adequately supervised. Food preparation areas lack essential equipment to ensure good hygiene. Nevertheless, staff know what to do if they have a child protection concern. They can recognise the indicators of child abuse. The manager ensures robust staff recruitment and confirms the ongoing suitability of staff to fulfil their roles.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.

Inspection activities

- Children interacted with the inspector during the inspection.
- Staff spoke to the inspector during the inspection.
- The inspector carried out joint observations of a group reading activity with the manager.
- The inspector spoke to two parents during the inspection and took account of their views.
- The manager showed the inspector documentation to demonstrate the suitability of staff.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
