#### What is it like to attend this early years setting?

#### This provision meets requirements

Children enjoy attending this tranquil club. They arrive enthusiastically after a busy day in school, hanging up their belongings and sitting down for the register. Children understand the routines and show a strong sense of belonging. They are eager to find out what the snack is and say gleefully that they 'love croissants'. Staff make sure that children, particularly those who are new to the setting, are settled and happy.

Children are eager to join in with the play opportunities available. They use their own ideas while thinking of games to play and creating artwork, such as a 'field of flowers' and a 'monster with googly eyes'. Children use their small-muscle skills while designing jewellery and making bracelets using pipe cleaners. They develop their number knowledge while making bingo cards and engaging in role play. Children pretend to be a teacher and encourage their friends to add numbers together. They spend time outdoors each day. Children build their physical skills while using hula hoops, climbing over tyres, and jumping off onto the grass. Staff join in with the fun and children giggle with delight during a much-loved running game.

# What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The leadership and management of the club are strong. Their vision of providing a 'home-from-home' and a 'caring and nurturing' environment is fully realised. Carefully considered self-evaluation helps leaders in their pursuits of continually improving the club. For example, they are developing a 'curiosity' approach to further enrich children's play.
- Staff and leaders alike are clear that 'this is the children's club'. As such, they continually seek children's ideas and their interests to determine the activities that they would like, such as a small fairy world. These activities also complement children's learning from school. For example, children have been learning about 'The Colour Monster' to help them to better manage their own feelings and emotions. Children can sit in a 'cosy area' to read and complete their homework. They enjoy using pens and whiteboards to write and make marks, and to practise spelling words, such as 'brilliant'.
- Children are developing a good understanding of the modern society in which they live. They learn about topics, such as Black History Month and countries from around the world. Children are confident to tell the inspector what they enjoy at the club. They become excited while telling the inspector about a holiday they are soon going on.
- Care practices are sound. Staff teach children to follow good hygiene practices, such as washing their hands before eating. They remind children to get a drink



- during exercise outdoors. Staff encourage children's independence. Children butter their own croissants and eat a range of wholesome foods, including crackers, fruits and 'pizza baquettes'.
- Children are remarkably well behaved. They are caring towards others, such as when gifting a bracelet that they have made. Children remind their friends to 'put the lid on' when they have finished using pens. They use good manners. For example, during snack time, which is a sociable event, children ask, 'Can you pass me the jam, please? Staff reward children's behaviour and their efforts, for example, with 'star of the week' and prizes.
- Leaders have established good links with the host school, for example staff communicate important information between teachers and parents. Parents report that the club provides an 'invaluable' service and that their children are 'really happy here'. They say that the 'level of attention and care' that staff provide is 'first-rate'.
- Staff access a comprehensive programme of training and support, which helps them to continue to improve their practice. The well-being of staff is a priority for leaders. They provide incentives, such as raffles and a 'jar of love' to encourage and recognise good work. Staff say that they 'love working here' and that they 'enjoy' their roles.

#### **Safeguarding**

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

All areas of the club are safe and secure. Leaders ensure that robust recruitment procedures are followed to ensure staff's suitability to work with children. Staff have up-to-date training in safeguarding. Leaders make sure that this knowledge is current and understood, for example, by asking staff scenario-based questions. Staff understand the local referral procedures, including the steps to take if they have concerns about children's welfare or the conduct of a colleague. They know how to protect children and help to keep them safe from harm. Staff have a broad understanding of safeguarding, including issues such as child neglect and the 'Prevent' duty.

#### **Inspection activities**

- Relevant documentation was reviewed by the inspector, including evidence of the suitability and training of staff.
- The inspector held discussions with leaders, staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector observed the interactions between staff and children as they engaged in activities indoors and outdoors.
- Parent views were obtained and considered by the inspector through discussions.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
