### **Inspection judgements**

#### Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: good

Since the last inspection, children have had positive experiences in this home and have been enjoying their day-to-day life. Children are well cared for and have positive relationships with staff. One child who had recently moved back to their birth family said, 'It's homely, caring, respectful, felt like home. Staff were always there for me when I needed them.'

Children attend education which is tailored to meet their individual needs. One child has been supported to transition from a specialist provision to college, to study health and social care. This provides children with ongoing learning opportunities.

The home has a therapist who is an integral part of the team. Effective partnership working between the therapist and staff supports children's emotional well-being, through therapy sessions and staff consultations. Therapists attend team meetings and regularly provide further training to staff. This means that staff develop their skills and knowledge in understanding trauma-based behaviours, which provides children with consistent care.

Staff support children to contribute to the plans for their care. Children are encouraged to share their views and wishes before any review meetings. This ensures that children's views and wishes are acted upon and improves their confidence and self-esteem.

A requirement was made at the last inspection in respect of maintenance of children's bathrooms. This issue has not yet been rectified.

#### How well children and young people are helped and protected: good

Staff understand and follow whistle-blowing and safeguarding procedures. For example, when a child made an allegation to a member of the team about other staff members, this allegation was reported to the manager, who quickly and robustly initiated safeguarding procedures. This action safeguards children while allegations are being investigated.

Children who are at risk of self-harming have detailed risk assessments in place. A multi-agency approach, including the home's therapist and child and adolescent mental health services, assesses potential risks to ensure that a cohesive safety plan is in place which staff understand and can manage. While staff understand the procedures to follow when a child has self-harmed, they must ensure that any need for medical attention is escalated without delay, to ensure children's safety.

Staff support children to understand their behaviours and how to keep themselves safe by carrying out direct work. This helps children to understand and reduce their



risk-taking behaviours. As a result, one child has made good progress in reducing their number of missing-from-home incidents.

The manager has robust checks in place when recruiting new staff. This supports children's safety by ensuring that only suitable people are working in the home.

Medication is stored safely. Records demonstrate that staff understand how to administer, check and record medication appropriately. This ensures children receive the correct medication at the appropriate times, and contributes positively to children's overall well-being, health and safety.

#### The effectiveness of leaders and managers: good

Following a number of changes in the management and staff teams, staffing is now stable. The registered manager and responsible individual have mentored and developed the deputy manager to take on the role of manager. Throughout these changes, staff have felt supported.

Good collaborative working means that leaders and managers have positive working relationships with those involved in children's care. One social worker said: 'I am impressed with the placement. My child is provided with the best care. Safeguarding has always been a priority. Not only am I impressed, but I have had extremely positive feedback from virtual schools and the independent reviewing officer.'

Staff are committed to training and are up to date with mandatory training, which helps them develop in their role. The manager oversees creative team meetings, which include team-building activities. This develops relationships in the home and improves morale. Furthermore, staff feel valued and invested in, which has a positive impact on the home.

The manager's internal monitoring is effective and demonstrates her understanding of the children, the staff team and how the home is operating. These systems also help the manager identify any shortfalls, areas for development and good practice.
