Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this secure children's home

This secure home is managed by a local authority. It is approved by the Department for Education to restrict children's liberty. The home provides care for up to 10 children aged between 10 and 17 years.

There were five children living at the home at the time of this inspection.

The home provides accommodation for children placed by local authorities under section 25 of the Children Act 1989.

Admission of any child under section 25 of the Children Act 1989 who is under 13 years of age requires the approval of the Secretary of State.

The commissioning of health services in this home is the statutory responsibility of NHS England under the Health and Social Care Act 2012. Education is provided on site.

The manager registered with Ofsted in August 2022.

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Information about this inspection

At this inspection, the inspectors evaluated:

- the care of children
- the safety of children
- the effectiveness of leaders and managers.

Inspectors have looked closely at the experiences and progress of children, using the social care common inspection framework. This assurance inspection was carried out under the Care Standards Act 2000 to assess the effectiveness of the service, how it meets the core functions of the service as set out in legislation, and to consider how well it complies with the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 and the 'Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards'.



Findings from the inspection

We did not identify any serious or widespread concerns in relation to the care or protection of children at this assurance inspection.

The care of children

Children are relaxed and happy with staff. There are a range of activities for children to engage in, including an enrichment programme during school holidays. This includes children being able to participate in arts and a drama performance. The staff have captured these events on video to help children have positive memories.

Children are prepared well for leaving the home. Staff help children to develop skills for adulthood and in line with their plans. For example, children are supported to go out into the community with staff as they prepare for leaving the home.

Staff are looking after children to the best of their ability. They mainly keep them safe from harm as the children's needs are significant and complex.

The safety of children

When safeguarding concerns arise, staff and managers respond appropriately in line with the home's policy and procedures. There is good liaison and oversight by the local authority children's services. Records clarify the actions taken to help keep children safe. They show that concerns are reviewed quickly and concluded with appropriate actions being taken.

On a significant number of occasions, staff have physically restrained children. On some of these occasions, children have been placed in the prone position, which can increase risk. Although there is no evidence of significant concerns about practice, there is some risk due to the lack of effective management monitoring.

A notification was sent to Ofsted about an incident in August 2022. This involved the use of extreme measures with a child. Ofsted raised queries at the time and requested further information. The response lacked rigour and Ofsted requested that senior local authority managers carried out a review. The subsequent report was unsatisfactory and did not clearly identify areas for improvement and actions to be taken with timescales. As a result, inspectors reviewed this incident further during this inspection. Inspectors concluded that, although managers and staff had the best intentions in attempting to keep a child safe under difficult circumstances, the actions taken lacked key considerations that could have impacted on the child's safety. The manager recognised and agreed with the inspector's findings and is committed to carrying out a further urgent reflective review, which will be provided to Ofsted within a week.



The effectiveness of leaders and managers

There were three statutory requirements and two recommendations made at the last inspection. The two recommendations related to education, and these will be reviewed at the next full inspection. The arrangements with the GP have been reviewed and actions are being taken to improve the service provided to children. The home's statement of purpose has been updated and sent to Ofsted. It accurately describes what the home provides for children. One requirement has not been fully met. Although staff are now receiving an annual appraisal, challenges remain in staff recruitment, which is impacting on the frequency of supervision. Although efforts have been made to improve this, shortfalls remain.

The manager does not carry out any analysis of trends, themes and patterns relating to restraint practices, and the monitoring records are weak. They do not show that where the narrative indicates queries about practice, including the use of prone restraint, that managers have explored this and drawn conclusions about the care of children, whether prone restraint was justified, and whether there is any learning.

Recommendations

- The registered person should ensure that they more fully integrate life skills, independent living skills and digital skills into the wider curriculum and the work of the home, expanding their accredited qualification offer to include these subjects. - The registered person should ensure that the incremental steps, made by those children who have the greatest distance to travel, are captured and celebrated to reflect the progress they are making in their social, personal and academic development. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 62, paragraph 14.5)
