What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

The breaches in the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the early years foundation stage have a significant impact on the learning, safety and well-being of the children. The quality of care and education is too variable. The provider does not make sure that all staff understand child development and are able to provide a good quality of teaching. Staff working with babies and toddlers do not know how to effectively engage children and help them think for themselves. In addition, some staff do not know how to safely pick up the youngest children. Neither do they identify and eliminate risks. This puts children's health and safety at risk.

Nevertheless, staff are kind and build warm relationships with children. Children seek reassurance and comfort from staff, when they become tired or upset. Staff teach children to use their manners and older children independently serve their food and clear out the tables after lunch. This helps children gain skills needed for their eventual move to school. The provider ensures children receive healthy and nutritious meals via a fully vegetarian menu. Older children talk about food and learn why it is good for them.

While staff working with older children manage their behaviour appropriately, staff working with younger children do not. They do not explain what the expectations for children's behaviour are and how they could impact on each other. This does not support children's understanding of acceptable behaviour and affects their personal and social development.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The provider does not have an adequate oversight of the quality and standards at the setting. They have failed to identify and rapidly address breaches in the requirements and weaknesses in staff's performance.
- Staff working with younger children do not always engage in conversations with children to motivate and encourage them. They miss opportunities to follow children's interests and restrict them with routine planning. For example, during circle time, children who are not interested in listening are not allowed to leave and brought back to the circle. As a result, those children quickly loose interest and distract others with unwanted behaviour.
- The management team does not ensure that staff recognise potential risks to children. For example, they allow children to eat finger food while walking and do not see it as a choking hazard. In addition, food provided on the walks is out of date and stored inappropriately, which puts children's health and safety at risk.
- Staff have regular supervision meetings, but they are not effective and do not provide enough professional development for staff. As a result, some staff do



not understand their roles and responsibilities and provide weak quality of teaching and inconsistent practice, particularly those working with younger children.

- Leaders have not ensured that staff know children well enough to be able to plan their individual learning. For example, staff do not know the languages children speak at home and how to promote it in the setting. This limits children's progress.
- All children have daily opportunities to access outdoor activities and go for a walk. This helps to support their physical development and social skills.
- Staff support older children to develop their communication skills. Children listen to stories, learn about people who help, such as firefighters, and answer questions about emergency numbers, clothing they wear and actions they do.
- Parents report that they receive regular information about their children's day in the setting.
- Staff working with older children identify delays or gaps in children's development and work in partnerships with external agencies. This helps children to progress and catch up with their peers.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

The provider has not improved their recruitment system to ensure thorough vetting procedures are applied for all staff, including volunteers, before they are allowed to provide any personal care or be left alone with children. Not all staff who handle and serve food have completed required food hygiene training. Moreover, staff do not always act appropriately on all accidents, and do not provide required first-aid treatment, which is not recorded and shared with parents. This compromises children's safety and well-being. Nevertheless, staff have improved their safeguarding knowledge and understanding of various chid protection matters.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.

Inspection activities

- The manager and the inspector discussed the organisation of the setting and the educational programmes during the learning walk.
- The inspector completed joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector observed the quality of education being provided in all rooms, during the outside walk and assessed the impact on children's learning.
- A sample of required documentation was viewed by the inspector, including the suitability of staff and safeguarding policies.
- The inspector spoke to the parents, the manager, staff and children and took account of their views and experiences.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
