Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- There are breaches of the requirements of the early years foundation stage. The childminder does not have a secure understanding of how children develop and learn. She does not demonstrate that she knows how to observe and assess what children know already. This lack of knowledge prevents the childminder from describing how she will plan suitable activities, which will help children to progress in their next steps in learning.
- The childminder is unaware of the requirement to complete the progress check for children aged between two and three years. Moreover, she does not demonstrate sufficient knowledge of the prime areas of learning beyond children's language and communication development.
- The childminder fails to demonstrate that she maintains children's records, such as their hours of attendance and personal information appropriately. She is not able to retrieve children's emergency contact details if required. This is because children's records are unavailable and inaccessible for inspection. This is a breach of a safeguarding requirement.
- The childminder has some understanding of how to promote positive partnerships with parents. For example, she knows that she must keep parents informed of their children's routines and activities.
- The childminder understands that children benefit from regular visits to the park and library. She recognises that these opportunities provide children with additional social interaction and promote their physical skills.
- The childminder confidently describes how she organises her environment, so children can freely explore and play. She knows that speaking to children with simple words and naming objects helps them to build their early language skills.
- The childminder demonstrates that she has assessed some risks. For instance, she has installed safety gates in her home. The childminder explains that this prevents children accessing areas unsupervised.
- The childminder knows that only adults who have been fully vetted are permitted to care for children unsupervised. She knows that she must check the suitability of any assistants.
- The childminder has attended mandatory training in first aid and safeguarding. This has helped improve her knowledge of local safeguarding procedures and her responsibility to report concerns.
- The childminder explains how she provides consistent routines for children. She explains how she will meet children's basic care needs, such as their dietary, hygiene and sleep needs. The childminder knows that this contributes to helping children to settle and feel safe and secure.



There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:
