Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This home is operated and managed by a local authority to provide care for up to three children who may have emotional and/or social difficulties.

The manager registered with Ofsted in May 2015.

The inspector spoke to the three children who live in the home.

Inspection date: 7 December 2022

This monitoring visit

The monitoring visit was carried out in response to potential safeguarding concerns identified within the regulation 40 and regulation 44 notifications. The information included within these notifications indicated that there may be insufficient staffing arrangements effecting the care and safety of the children.

During the monitoring visit, significant breaches in the regulations were found.

Leaders have failed to ensure that all staff working in the home have the necessary skills and training to meet the children's needs. This includes a high number of staff who have not received the provider's mandatory training, such as safeguarding training and the provider's identified method of physical intervention training. There are times when staff are on shift without any relevant training. This has resulted in children not being supported in line with their relevant plans, which has resulted in the police being called to manage the children's behaviour.

Senior leaders have not fully considered all of the care needs for all of the children when they have agreed to a child being placed in the home. The decision makers did not give sufficient consideration to how the registered manager and the staff could meet all of the children's needs safely. This has had a detrimental effect on the child who moved



into the home and on those children who were already living in the home and deemed to be settled and progressing well prior to this decision.

The manager does not apply safer recruitment checks to agency staff and nonpermanent staff. The manager does not consistently check the applicants' employment history, or if their employment references are relevant, suitable or have been verified. In addition, she is unaware if the agency staff have been subject to any disciplinary investigations or actions, or if there are any safeguarding or practice concerns. This practice has the potential to expose the children to the risk of harm.

Children are not helped to build positive and trusting relationships with the staff. Staffing shortages mean that a high level of agency staff are used. These unfamiliar staff do not provide a consistent level of care to the children, and the children are prevented from building positive relationships based on mutual trust and respect.

Staff struggle to implement consistent boundaries and to manage the children's behaviours effectively. This has left some children feeling scared and worried. Furthermore, some children isolate themselves in their own spaces. One child said, 'I never know who is going to be here, I must have had eight different staff this week who I've never met before, I just stay in my bedroom'.

Staff have not been able to meet the children's behavioural needs as set out within their individual plans, and the staff have failed to de-escalate a recent incident. This resulted in the police be called to manage the child's behaviour. This practice increases the risk of children being criminalised.

Children's privacy is not respected. Closed-circuit television devices and bedroom door alarms are used to monitor the movement of the children. There is no rationale for this practice, nor is it reviewed. This practice is not reflected in the children's risk assessments, and the necessary consent has not been obtained from the children's placing local authority to acknowledge their agreement to this practice.

The registered manager has failed to submit all of the relevant information regarding a safeguarding incident to Ofsted within the required timescale. This oversight prevents Ofsted from reviewing and monitoring the safeguarding arrangements for children to ensure that the correct action is taken to safeguard the children.

Leaders and managers have failed to send the independent person's report to Ofsted in a timely way. Additionally, the local authority designated officer (LADO) was not promptly informed of an allegation made about a staff member. These failings prevent safeguarding agencies from having oversight of the home, and taking prompt action, when children may be at risk of harm.

Following this monitoring visit and the shortfalls identified, a decision was made to issue an urgent notice to reduce the numbers of children living at the home. Additionally, compliance notices were issued under regulation 12: The protection of children standard, regulation 13: The Leadership and management standard, regulation 14: The



care planning standard and regulation 32: Fitness of workers. Requirements were also raised under regulation 11: The positive relationships standard, regulation 24: Monitoring and Surveillance, regulation 40: Notification of a serious event and regulation 44: The independent person: visits and reports.

The previously issued requirements under regulation 35 and 36, and elements of regulation 40 were not fully reviewed during the visit. For this reason, they are reissued.

Statutory requirements
