The quality and standards of early years provision

What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision does not meet requirements

Children's safety is not assured as staff do not follow risk assessments put in place to minimise the risk of harm to children. Leaders have not ensured that staff understand the procedure to follow if they have concerns about another member of staff. Furthermore, leaders have failed to ensure that staff with the required qualifications to look after early years children are present on site at all times. These breaches to the early years foundation stage requirements compromise children's safety and well-being.

Despite these weaknesses, children enjoy their time at the setting. They explore a wide range of resources and experiences that are available for them. Staff take their lead from the children to extend their play and give children opportunities to make their own decisions. Children behave well. Staff have set out clear expectations for the children and behaviour is well managed.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Leaders do not ensure that staff have a thorough knowledge and understanding of their role and responsibility to follow risk assessments. For example, the door to the kitchen is left open, allowing children access to enter this area where there is unsafe equipment. Despite there being a risk assessment in place, staff failed to follow this by making sure the door is closed to ensure the environment is safe for the children. This puts children at risk of harm.
- Leaders fail to ensure that staff with the required qualifications are scheduled to be on site and present while early years children are in attendance. In addition, leaders do not ensure that there is always a qualified manager on site or named deputy, who is capable and qualified to take charge in the manager's absence. This further compromises children's safety.
- Leaders do not ensure that staff training is effective and that staff fully understand the information they have received. For example, staff attend safeguarding training and are able to demonstrate some understanding of aspects of child protection. However, there are gaps in some areas of staff knowledge and understanding, such as the whistle-blowing policy. This has an impact on the safety and well-being of the children.
- Children can freely access fresh drinking water. They have regular opportunities to access the outdoor area for fresh air. Staff provide healthy snacks for children and talk to them about healthy foods. However, good health is not consistently promoted. For example, children are not encouraged to wash their hands before mealtimes. This results in hygiene practices not being fully embedded.
- Children behave extremely well. The setting has clear routines in place for children to follow. Children understand rules and play well with each other. If



- conflict arises, staff support children to talk about their differences and come to a resolution. This promotes respect for others.
- Children develop secure bonds with the staff. They seek out staff throughout the day to help them with building a construction block village or to practise their mark-making skills. Staff are enthusiastic with children, which keeps them engaged in experiences and forms strong relationships. This helps children to feel secure.
- Staff know the children well. They provide experiences based on children's interests. Children have a voice and can make choices and decisions about what they do at the setting. For example, children enjoyed making paper aeroplanes, so this activity was repeated and turned into a competition that all the children were able to join in with. This gives children a strong sense of belonging.
- The setting has strong working relationships with the local schools. They have found out about teaching methods, such as handwriting styles from each school. This enables them to complement children's learning in accordance with the school they attend while at the setting.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Weaknesses in risk assessments and staffing arrangements put children at risk of harm. Staff are not clear on the setting's policies and procedures that they need to follow if they are concerned about another member of staff and need to whistle-blow. This has an impact on the safety and well-being of the children. However, staff do demonstrate an understanding of the potential signs and symptoms of child abuse and the correct procedure for reporting any concerns about the welfare of children. Staff have completed paediatric first-aid training and are clear on procedures to follow if a child has an accident.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is not meeting requirements and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.

We will issue a Welfare Requirements Notice requiring the provider to:

Playclub Unlimited registered in 2011. The club cares for children who attend the school and surrounding schools. The club is based on the school site of St. Josephs RC Infant & Nursery School but runs independently from the school. The club operates Monday to Friday, all year round, from 7am to 8.45am and 3pm to 6pm during term time and 8am to 5.30pm during school holidays. The club employs six members of childcare staff. Of these, one member of staff holds a recognised early years qualification and two staff hold recognised playworker qualifications.
