What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision meets requirements

Children show a sense of enjoyment as they spend time in the setting. Warm relationships with staff help children to feel settled and happy. Staff are fun and make children laugh by making jokes. Children enjoy the playfulness they share with staff and benefit from the nurturing care they receive. For example, when children fall over, they receive reassurance and comfort.

Staff involve children in decision-making, giving them a sense of belonging. Children help to plan the snack menu, which helps them learn how to be healthy. Staff use a variety of ways to gain children's opinions of the range of activities they provide. For example, children complete surveys and talk to staff about their preferences.

Children's self-esteem is well supported. Staff encourage children to join in when they are apprehensive. They remind children of their strengths and encourage them to have a go. For example, they say, 'You can do it, you're good at this, let's try together.' Children share their achievements by showing awards and certificates to the group. They smile as they receive praise from the staff.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Children enjoy structured learning programmes that build on their knowledge each week. Each day teaches new skills for specific topics such as gymnastics, cooking and adventuring. Well-planned activities teach children practical skills in a fun and engaging way. For example, children learn how emergency services help people by playing a game involving moving differently. They learn vital first-aid skills as they practise the recovery position. Skilled staff help all children take part by adapting the activity to suit all abilities.
- Children display positive attitudes and behave well. Staff are good role models and show kindness to one another. For example, they ask each other for support, always saying 'please' and 'thank you'. This teaches the children to show respect for others. Children talk about the golden rules, which they helped to create. This includes being kind, being polite, helping others and putting in an effort. The staff have high expectations for behaviour. They support children with clear boundaries, helping them learn right from wrong.
- Parents are happy with the care their children receive. They explain that children enjoy their time as the activities are fun and exciting. Parents praise staff for the relationships they have formed with their children. They describe them as kind and friendly. Parents know what is happening in the setting, as staff are good at communicating with them.
- The leadership team supports staff development well. They actively improve



staff training systems by creating in-house programmes. Trained leaders deliver a range of courses such as health and safety, food hygiene, first aid and safeguarding. This ensures that staff have the knowledge they need to care for children. They can receive further support when required. This results in staff being competent in their roles. Staff have access to training that supports the individual children in their care. They commend the leaders for their ongoing support and feel valued as team members.

■ The interview and induction processes for new staff are thorough. The human resources team have developed a comprehensive system to support staff. As a result, new staff gain confidence when preparing for their roles. This ensures that the setting provides a consistently high-quality service.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

All staff are aware of their safeguarding responsibilities. Staff confidently explain how to make a referral to social services if they have concerns about a child. They can describe the possible symptoms of abuse in a variety of scenarios. Staff feel confident in their safeguarding roles. Training is regular and leaders check staff's knowledge every half term. Staff understand how to keep children safe while in their care. The premises are assessed for risks. Staff use fobs to open doors and walkie-talkies to stay in contact when they are not together.
