Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder lacks knowledge of the requirements of the early years foundation stage. She has a weak understanding of the learning and development requirements. The childminder does not recognise the importance of assessment to identify what children can do and need to do next. Consequently, she is unable to describe how she will plan activities effectively to help children to make suitable levels of progress in all areas of their development.
- The childminder does not understand her responsibility to complete the progress check for children when they are aged between two and three years. As a result, she does not have a knowledge of how to use assessment as a tool to identify any areas of a child's development which may need extra support and share this with parents.
- The childminder recognises the importance of children being active and learning to have a healthy lifestyle. She describes how she intends to use her outdoor area, so that children have plenty of opportunities to exercise and play in the fresh air. The childminder shares her lunch menu, which offers nourishing food for children.
- The childminder recognises the importance of providing an inclusive service. She knows that children have different cultural backgrounds and describes how she will promote children's understanding of the differences and similarities between themselves and others.
- The childminder does not demonstrate a sufficient understanding of her safeguarding responsibilities. She is unclear about the procedure she must follow should a child make an allegation against a family member. The childminder lacks knowledge of the 'Prevent' duty.
- The childminder explains how she maintains close working relationships with the parents. She explains how she intends to keep in contact with them using emails and text message, as well as face-to-face meetings.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:

- The inspector sampled a range of relevant documentation, including the childminder's qualifications and information records.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to support children's learning and development.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she meets the safeguarding and welfare requirements when minding children.
