What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

Children who attend this nursery are not sufficiently safeguarded and are at risk of harm. Ineffective risk assessments and poorly implemented safety checks do not identify and remove hazards. For example, children play outdoors where there are large shards of broken glass in a planting trough. Leaders do not implement a rigorous cleaning schedule. Therefore, staff are unaware who is responsible for the daily checks of the environment. Sinks are dirty, bin lids are soiled and unclean trays are left next to where babies sleep.

Children are not protected from the spread of infection. Hand hygiene is poor. Babies crawl around outside, then do not wash their hands before eating. Staff do not always change their gloves and aprons between nappy changes. This puts children at risk of cross-contamination of germs. Poor deployment of staff means children's needs are not being met. Children spend long periods needing their noses wiping or support with toileting. Staff fail to notice when a child is leaning on a table almost falling asleep. This negatively impacts on children's well-being and health.

Children are polite and use good manners. They enjoy taking appropriate risks as they race down a slope on ride-on toys. They follow instructions well, such as lining up to get ready to go outside.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Leaders fail to ensure their staff have a good knowledge of safeguarding procedures. Some staff do not know who to contact if they have concerns about a child's welfare. Staff lack awareness of female genital mutilation (FGM) and the 'Prevent' duty. This means they cannot protect children and be alert to this happening.
- The quality of teaching is inadequate. Leaders fail to deploy staff effectively to meet the learning needs of children. Staff are busy attending to auxiliary tasks, such as preparing food and tidying up. This leaves children often wandering around without focus or meaningful interactions with staff. Teaching is infrequent and does not challenge children enough. This means children do not make the progress they are capable of.
- Leaders describe what they want children to learn in the nursery. However, they do not effectively monitor the implementation of the curriculum. Poor planning of the nursery routines means children spend too long waiting without purpose. For example, babies wait in their seats at lunchtime long before their food is ready. Staff struggle to fill this time with useful teaching. As a result, children become fed up and upset.
- Staff teach children to use walking feet, put their listening ears on and use kind



hands. Most of the time children follow their instructions. Staff notice when children climb on cable reels, but do not explain the impact of the unwanted behaviour. This means another child copies the same behaviour shortly after. Children do not get a good understanding of how to keep themselves safe.

- Leaders do not promote healthy lifestyles and good oral health. Some of the children present, including young babies, bring in their own drink, which is normally squash. Fresh drinking water is not easily available for children to access. This impacts on the long-term good health of their teeth.
- Leaders do not ensure there is an effective key-person system in place for when staff are absent. Staff who are covering absences do not know children's individual next steps, so cannot successfully support their learning and development. This hinders children's overall progress, especially if their key person is due to be off for a prolonged period.
- Parents speak well of the nursery and say their children are happy attending. Information about their child is shared verbally with parents at the beginning and end of the day.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Hazards and risks are not identified and removed from the environment during safety checks. This means children are in danger and risk sustaining an injury. Children play next to large shards of broken glass. Staff do not know the procedure to follow if they are concerned about a child's welfare. Staff are unable to describe the signs and symptoms of FGM and radicalisation. This means children cannot be safeguarded from them. Leaders do implement safe and robust recruitment procedures, and they assess the ongoing suitability of staff that work with children.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:

Little Folks Day Nursery in Kidderminster registered in 2016. The nursery employs nine members of childcare staff. Of these, two hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 5, five hold qualifications at level 3, one holds a qualification at level 2 and one is unqualified. The nursery opens from Monday to Friday, all year round. Sessions are from 7.30am until 6pm. The nursery provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed the provision and discussed the safety and suitability of the premises.
- The inspector talked to staff at appropriate times during the inspection and took account of their views.
- The inspector observed the quality of education being provided, indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact that this was having on children's learning.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
