Information about this children's home

The home is run by a private company, which is owned by a national charity. It can provide care for up to three children with social, emotional and behavioral difficulties.

There has been no registered manager since May 2022. A manager was appointed but left before completing registration with Ofsted. A new manager has been appointed and started on 1 March 2023.

Information about this inspection

At this inspection, the inspectors evaluated:

- the care of children
- the safety of children
- the effectiveness of leaders and managers.

Inspectors have looked closely at the experiences and progress of children, using the social care common inspection framework. This assurance inspection was carried out under the Care Standards Act 2000 to assess the effectiveness of the service, how it meets the core functions of the service as set out in legislation, and to consider how well it complies with the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 and the 'Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards'.



Findings from the inspection

We did not identify any serious or widespread concerns in relation to the care or protection of children at this assurance inspection.

The care of children

This inspection was carried out following an increase in notifications sent to Ofsted by the provider relating to allegations against staff, and the sudden departure of the home manager. Since the last inspection, two children have been supported to move on from the home to independent living. Another child has moved from the home due to an escalation in unforeseen risks which was impacting on other children. Currently, two children remain living in the home.

The educational progress for children is mixed. Where there are shortfalls in one child's engagement, these have been escalated to the virtual school to provide individual tutoring. Another child is engaging well in their education and making progress.

Children are healthy and enjoy being active. However, one child's health condition identified in their care planning is not fully understood by staff. However, this has not impacted the child's well-being to date.

The safety of children

Some staff have not always role modelled appropriate behaviour with children and, subsequently, children have raised concerns. These concerns have been reported appropriately, and professional boundaries training for staff has taken place where needed.

Risks for children are understood by the staff. However, the staff are not proactive in educating children about current risks such as accessing social media and age restrictions. This is a missed opportunity to support children's learning around esafety.

There are plans for the local safeguarding team to complete work with staff and children in the home. This is due to an increase in allegations being made about staff. Staff have not been proactive in supporting children to understand allegation processes and their safeguarding needs.

The requirement regarding safer recruitment made at the previous inspection has been met.



The effectiveness of leaders and managers

The staff are aware of their safeguarding responsibilities and the action to take when a child makes an allegation or complaint. They know the role of the local authority designated officer and feel confident to report any concerns made by children.

Staff sometimes implement consequences for children's behaviour so they can learn about positive behaviour. However, on occasion, this is not always restorative in nature and some records have not been completed.

Some staff have worked excessive hours during difficult periods for children. For example, some staff have worked double shifts and waking nights followed by a double shift. Consequently, some staff have not been given sufficient time to rest between shifts.

Recommendations

In particular, consequences should be restorative in nature, and records should be fully completed. - The registered person is responsible for ensuring that each child's day-to-day health and well-being needs are met. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 33, paragraph 7.3)
