

Compliance action taken for childcare provision

Summary of outcome

All early years providers must meet the legal requirements in the Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage, which you can find at www.gov.uk/government/publications/early-years-foundation-stage-framework--2. If we find that a provider is not meeting the requirements, we can take action to ensure they put matters right.

On 17 May 2023, we carried out an inspection and found the provider was not meeting some of these requirements. The report and inspection outcome will be published in due course. Following the inspection we served a welfare requirements notice on 30 May 2023. This is a legal notice that requires the provider to take the actions below within the timescales set out. The provider will be able to give parents further information about this. Actions needed by 9 June 2023

- ensure effective arrangements for the supervision of staff who work with children are in place to promote the interests of children
- ensure staff receive training that is focused to meet the needs of all children, with particular regard to those children who speak English as an additional language
- ensure that the key person system is effective and supports staff to implement an ambitious curriculum which meets the individual needs of all children
- ensure systems are in place to support children's health and well-being.
- ensure key information is shared with parents and other professionals working with

children to help meet the needs of all children.

On 14 June 2023, we carried out a regulatory visit. The focus of the visit was to check whether the provider had met the safeguarding and welfare actions, raised at their last inspection.

We found that the provider had taken sufficient action. The provider has placed an emphasis on staff supervision and ensures all staff receive adequate training and support to continually improve their knowledge and skills. Staff are now adequately trained to meet the diverse needs of all children, including those with English as an additional language. The provider has appropriate arrangements in place to ensure key information is shared with parents and other professionals. This means children receive the right support when they need it most. Furthermore, the provider has adapted the curriculum so that it meets the learning needs of all children. Meetings have taken place with staff to ensure that they have a clear understanding of their key children's progress and what the next steps are for them. The provider has improved the systems to promote children's good health and well-being. Staff support children to develop an understanding of good hygiene practices such as wiping their own noses and washing their hands after going to the bathroom.

We are satisfied that the provider has met the safeguarding and welfare actions raised. The provider is still registered with Ofsted.
