What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

Children's safety is not prioritised at this nursery. This is because staff and leaders fail to take swift and timely action when concerns are raised about a child's welfare or when the suitability of a member of staff is questioned. In addition to this, the key-person system is poor. For example, when children have a new key person, staff do not share key information about the child with each other. Therefore, children do not receive the consistency they require in their care and learning.

The quality of teaching and learning that children receive is weak. There are multiple occasions when staff do not think well enough about children's individual needs as they access activities or large-group circle times. Consequently, a lot of children are not able to accomplish the activities that are set out for them. In addition, staff do not recognise children who require more support to get involved in the activities on offer. This means that some children spend considerable periods of time unengaged and wandering around. This does not ensure that all children are able to make good progress in their learning.

Despite the fact that staff quickly go over to children when they become upset, they do not support children to start to understand their feelings and emotions. As a result, children do not routinely learn what is expected and how to behave well. However, children say that they like to come to nursery. Some older children independently select where they want to play. They have fun playing together on the bicycles or with the trains.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Leaders fail to maintain adequate recruitment or safeguarding records. Some files cannot be located or found, and others are not recorded effectively. This does not ensure the safe running of the nursery or meet children's needs. In addition, induction processes are not robust enough. This is because staff do not have sound knowledge of the nursery's safeguarding procedures. These weaknesses place children at unnecessary risk of harm.
- The support that staff receive is not focused enough on helping to improve their emotional well-being or coaching them to help improve their teaching practice. Staff often move at pace through activities, which does not support children to consolidate their learning. In addition, staff read stories in close proximity to each other or talk very loudly over the story to each other. This ends up completely distracting the children. These weaknesses limit children's ability to thrive at the nursery. However, staff do comment fairly positively about the support they receive from leaders.
- Although staff complete observations and assessments of the children, they do not use this information well enough to ensure that children make the progress



they are fully capable of. This is because staff do not share this information with each other or use the information to help plan activities that build on children's knowledge.

- Parents do not know who is responsible for their child's care and learning at nursery. They also do not know how they can continue their child's learning at home. Although all children have a key person, this information is not shared swiftly enough with parents. However, parents comment that their children like to come to nursery. They also say that staff are very helpful and friendly.
- Staff do not think well enough about the organisation of routines or activities. This limits how well they are able to respond to children's needs as they play. Children also spend long periods of time waiting for staff to set up the next part of the routine. During this time, children become unsettled and frustrated.
- Staff do not place enough emphasis on children's personal development. They do not speak to the children about how their actions affect others. Consequently, at times, children do not show enough care or respect towards one another.
- Staff provide children with a range of healthy and balanced meals. Children also help themselves to fresh drinking water throughout the day. Staff apply children's sunscreen as needed. They also provide opportunities for the children to get physical or play outdoors. This starts to support children to learn how they can live healthy lifestyles.
- The newly recruited manager is knowledgeable. She has started to identify ways that the nursery can move forward. However, she has not been in place for long enough to help make the necessary improvements to the overall quality of the nursery.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Leaders have failed to take the relevant action needed to ensure that children are kept safe from harm. Recently, staff shared numerous safeguarding concerns with leaders about the suitability of staff and welfare of children, but these were ignored. The new nursery manager recognises that this is a significant failing and has now reported the concerns to the relevant agencies. However, this was not done in a timely way. Furthermore, despite recent events, leaders do not ensure that all staff fully understand their safeguarding policies and procedures. Staff show no understanding of their local safeguarding partners' procedures or how to follow these when they feel children are at risk of harm. This places children at significant risk of harm. Staff knowledge of the nursery's smoking and mobile phone procedure is sound. Leaders take action to ensure they meet the correct staff-to-child ratio requirements. Staff deploy themselves well to ensure that they supervise the children well as they eat and play.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement



action.
