The home is privately owned and can provide care for up to four children who experience social and emotional difficulties.

There is no registered manager in post, and the interim manager has not submitted an application to register with Ofsted.

There are serious and widespread failures that mean children and young people are not protected or their welfare is not promoted or safeguarded, and the care and experiences of children and young people are poor, and they are not making progress.

Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: inadequate

Children's experiences are adversely affected due to the shortfalls in safeguarding practice and leadership and management at the home.

Since the last inspection, two children have moved out. Their moves were not positive as leaders and staff do not have the knowledge and skills to manage these moves well.

The home environment is not maintained to an acceptable standard. Children's bedrooms are not personalised and need a general clean and redecoration. This does not help children develop a sense of belonging.

Staff do not have a good understanding of the children's individual needs and experiences. Staff do not have the skills, nor do they know children well enough to support them to understand their care planning arrangements or contribute to decisions that affect their lives.

Children do not attend education. There are no educational activities or plans in place to support children's learning and development. Children do not have positive routines or structures to their days. Inspectors observed that children stayed in their bedrooms without any encouragement from staff to engage in any formal or informal learning. Poor routines and sleep patterns negatively affect children's well-being and progress.

Children's health needs have not been appropriately identified or responded to. Children are not supported to access specialist health services relevant to their individual needs. For example, leaders and staff do not take sufficient action to help children understand the health and associated risks from smoking and vaping.

Staff promote children's time with their families. Parents are complimentary about the significant support that staff provide to ensure that children can see their families.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: inadequate

Leaders and staff do not demonstrate that there is a strong and proactive response to managing risk. Leaders and staff do not identify when children may be at risk of harm. Consequently, effective action is not taken to reduce potential risks to children.

Staff spoken to do not demonstrate an understanding about their roles and responsibilities in keeping children safe. Children are vulnerable to harm, as staff do not know what action to take to keep them safe.



Children's risk assessments are not effectively updated, and the information recorded is confusing and conflicting. Leaders and staff do not ensure that risk assessments contain relevant or clear strategies to help staff know what actions to take in practice.

Children have missing-from-home plans in place, although these do not consider children's individual needs. This compromises children's safety when they are missing from home.

Leaders and staff do not demonstrate any professional curiosity when incidents occur. This means that there are missed opportunities for staff to take effective action to reduce the risk of harm to children.

Arrangements for managing and recording medication are not safe. Leaders and staff do not follow their own medication policies and procedures. Leaders and staff do not know one child's specific health needs. This compromises his welfare and safety.

Arrangements to respond to and manage allegations are ineffective. Records in relation to allegations do not include management oversight. Leaders do not review and monitor allegations to understand how to support and protect children. As a result, opportunities to reflect and learn are missed.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: inadequate

There is no registered manager in post. There is an interim manager in post. She has not submitted her application to register with Ofsted within the relevant timescales.

Management oversight of the home is poor. Leaders do not have effective monitoring and review systems in place. Several documents are not up to date, including the home's statement of purpose. The statement of purpose has not been appropriately reviewed and does not give an accurate account of staffing details, experience and qualifications.

Leaders do not monitor and review care practices. There is no evidence of learning from practice. This impacts on children's experiences living in the home.

Supervision does not take place in line with the home's own policies and procedures. Therefore, there are missed opportunities for leaders to establish staff knowledge. Weaknesses in practice have not been appropriately identified. Staff with no previous experience and without sufficient support have been left alone to care for children.



Leaders and staff have not demonstrated that they have taken sufficient action to address the shortfalls at previous inspections. This means that there are four requirements restated.

Due to the serious and widespread failings identified at this inspection, compliance notices have been issued under regulation 12, the protection of children standard, regulation 13, the leadership and management standard and regulation 23, the medicine standard.



What does the children's home need to do to improve? Statutory requirements

take part in activities, and attend any appointments, for the purpose of meeting the child's health and well-being needs; and	
understand and develop skills to promote the child's well- being;	
that each child has access to such dental, medical, nursing, psychiatric and psychological advice, treatment and other services as the child may require. (Regulation 10 (1)(a)(c) (2)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(iv)(c))	
Leaders and managers must ensure that children are supported to understand the impact of smoking and vaping. Children should be helped to access appropriate services to help improve health and well-being.	
*The protection of children standard is that children are protected from harm and enabled to keep themselves safe.	13 August 2023
In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure—	
that staff—	
assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child;	
help each child to understand how to keep safe;	
have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm;

understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person;	
take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and	
are familiar with, and act in accordance with, the home's child protection policies;	
that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm;	
that the premises used for the purposes of the home are designed, furnished and maintained so as to protect each child from avoidable hazards to the child's health; and	
that the effectiveness of the home's child protection policies is monitored regularly.
