Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: good

Three children were living at the home at the time of the inspection. The staff know the children well, and there are good relationships between the staff and the children.

The children are all in education. Their attendance at school is good. Children make progress in line with their abilities. There are positive relationships between staff and school staff.

Staff encourage children to participate in activities. Some children attend local clubs and activities, which supports their interests. Children enjoy the opportunities that they are offered. Staff support children with their family relationships in accordance with their care plans.

Children sometimes move in without much time to plan for the move. The staff arrange a conversation with the child to support them to build relationships before coming to the home. This allows children to feel more comfortable about the move. Some children who have left the home remain in touch with staff.

Staff encourage children to help choose how their bedroom is decorated. There are plans to create another living area for the children, which children are positive about. There are door alarms on children's bedrooms. However, some children do not have consent for these alarms to be in use.

There are care plans and risk management plans for all children. Some plans are not regularly updated, which means that they do not contain the most up-to-date and relevant information. Therefore, staff may not be aware of all information when working with the children.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: good

Staff monitor the children when they are together. Bullying is not an issue. Staff understand children's experiences and risks and are aware of their triggers. This means that staff can ensure that appropriate supervision is provided in line with children's known risks.

The staff use restraint infrequently. Restraints are proportionate and used to keep children and staff safe.

When allegations are made by children, these are handled fairly and quickly. Staff report concerns effectively, and the local authority designated officer is informed. This means that children are safequarded, and investigations are carried out.



Staff do not always support children to understand their risks and how to keep safe. They have conversations with children but are not always curious enough about the details. Following incidents, the discussions with children are brief. This does not encourage children to learn about how to keep themselves safe and help to reduce the number of incidents.

Staff report children as missing from the home when they do not know their whereabouts. Missing-from-home incidents are not frequent. However, the staff do not always follow the missing-from-home protocols for children. This means that staff do not always report children as being away from the home in a timely manner. The supporting records lack detail. Therefore, the actions taken by the staff are unclear.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: good

The manager is experienced and qualified for the role. Professionals and families say that there are very good working relationships with the manager and staff. The staff say that they feel supported by the manager. The manager is child focused and understands the progress that children have made towards their goals.

The staff team is stable. Temporary staff are not used. Safer recruitment procedures are followed for new members of staff coming to the home. This allows children to develop relationships with the adults who are working with them.

There has been a change in the ownership of the home. Changes have been made to records and the senior management structure. The manager and staff have not let these changes impact on the children's care. This means that children have continued to be supported in ways that they know and expect.

Staff receive regular training. All staff are trained in areas that are relevant to the children living at the home.

Staff receive regular supervision. The manager identifies when supervision sessions are not held and has implemented a new monitoring system, which is working well. Regular supervision sessions support staff to develop their practice. Appraisals take place with staff; however, there is no feedback from professionals, colleagues or children as part of these appraisals. This limits staff's ability to reflect on their practice and identify areas for development. This was a recommendation at last inspection and has been raised again.

The manager has oversight following incidents; however, this lacks evaluation. The manager does not identify learning from incidents. This means that actions to reduce incidents or tailor support for children may be missed.



What does the children's home need to do to improve? Statutory requirements

Recommendations

- The registered person should ensure that the placing authority has given written consent at the time of placement for any monitoring or surveillance equipment to be used. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 16, paragraph 3.16)
- The registered person should ensure that information from internal monitoring is used to make continuous improvement. They should be skilled in anticipating difficulties and reviewing incidents. They are responsible for proactively implementing lessons learned and sustaining good practice. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 55, paragraph 10.24)
- The registered person should ensure that annual appraisals consider, where reasonable and practical, the views of other professionals who have worked with



the staff member over the year and children in the home's care. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 61, paragraph 13.5)

■ The registered person should ensure that all children's case records are kept up to date. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 62, paragraph 14.3)
