Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

### Information about this children's home

This privately owned home offers care for up to five children with mental health difficulties, psychological and/or emotional difficulties and associated complex care needs.

The registered manager post has been vacant since 23 March 2023. A new manager was appointed but did not commence the role. The interim manager is now remaining in post and will submit an application to register with Ofsted.

### This monitoring visit

On 28 March 2023, Ofsted conducted an assurance inspection. Serious and widespread concerns in relation to the care of children were identified. Two compliance notices were issued for regulation 6, the quality and purpose of care standard and regulation 13, the leadership and management standard.

On 31 May 2023 and 1 June 2023, Ofsted conducted a full inspection and serious and widespread failures were identified. Leaders and managers failed to meet both compliance notices issued at the assurance inspection in March 2023. Consequently, regulation 6, the quality and purpose of care standard and regulation 13, the leadership and management standard compliance notices were reissued, and a restriction of accommodation notice was issued.

On 7 June 2023, Ofsted received concerns regarding a serious incident that occurred on 6 June 2023 in relation to a child living at the home. The child alleged that they had come to harm and continued to be at risk. Subsequently, on 9 June 2023, Ofsted issued a suspension notice to the home.

This monitoring inspection has been completed to assess the progress made by leaders and managers in meeting the compliance notices issued at the full inspection and to assess whether the home is in a position to safely welcome new children.



Since the full inspection, two children have moved on. Despite the children moving on quickly due to the home being suspended, managers and staff worked well with social workers in supporting the children to move to their new homes.

The monitoring of the home by leaders and managers continues to be ineffective and is not leading to sustained improvements. Leaders and managers have failed to meet the compliance notice raised in relation to regulation 13, the leadership and management standard.

Managers have not prepared the staff team for new children moving into the home. For example, staff have not been provided with adequate opportunities to reflect on previous shortfalls and set out clear expectations so that good-quality care can be provided moving forward. As a result, it is not clear that staff have a good understanding about their roles and responsibilities in caring for children. Managers said that there would be a training and development day with staff before new children come to live at the home. However, this had not been organised.

Shortfalls remain in safer recruitment practices. For example, monitoring by managers has not identified that some important documentation had expired on a staff member's file.

A fire safety report set out that a review of the home's fire safety risk assessment should be undertaken in light of changes made to fire safety arrangements. This has not been completed in preparation for new children moving into the home and shows further weaknesses in the monitoring and review systems at the home.

Shortfalls in the supervision and appraisal of staff indicated a missed opportunity to develop staff's knowledge, understanding and skills. Although some staff were receiving supervision, the quality of this is lacking. For example, when members of staff have been involved in key events while working in other homes in the organisation, these events had not been discussed as part of supervision. As a result, it was unclear to managers at this home whether there was any learning for the staff member and whether the member of staff had an opportunity to reflect on what happened.

Staff have not received training since the last inspection to help them understand how to complete physical intervention records so that they are compliant with regulation. A physical intervention incident had occurred since the last inspection. However, the record of this incident did not include all the required information. For example, it was not evident that all staff involved had been spoken to about what happened.

Managers have now consulted partner agencies, such as the police, to inform the home's location risk assessment. However, this still needs updating to include all control measures that mitigate against all known local risks, such as information contained in children's missing-from-care protocols. The details of where the home is located are potentially misleading and need amending.



Managers have worked hard to make the home warm and welcoming for children. Internally, the home has been redecorated and new furniture has been purchased.

A new system to help managers track the progress of staff undertaking the level 3 diploma in residential childcare, or an equivalent qualification, is being implemented. This is helping to identify potential issues, and managers have plans to address this with staff to reduce the chances of further delays.

New systems have been developed by managers that, when implemented, will enable children to have their say about their experience of living at the home.
