Overall outcome

The school does not meet all of the independent school standards that were checked during this inspection

Main inspection findings

Part 1. Quality of education provided

Paragraph 2(1)(a)

- At the standard inspection in March 2023, leaders had not ensured that curriculum plans identified what pupils should know and remember in each subject. A new phonics curriculum was in place, but some staff did not have the expertise to teach reading consistently and effectively.
- All primary teachers and teaching assistants have now received appropriate training. As a result, the teaching of reading is much more consistent, and pupils are making better progress. Leaders have made reading a very high priority in the school. Pupils enjoy a wide range of fiction and non-fiction. They recognise the importance of reading in their learning across the curriculum. Good links with parents mean that reading is well-supported at home too.
- Leaders have purchased appropriate commercial schemes to support the planning and delivery of subject learning. They are aware of the need to adapt these to meet the needs of pupils in the school. Leaders have now established monitoring and assessment processes to check that pupils are learning what is intended and that those who need extra help are supported effectively.
- This previously unmet standard is now met.

Paragraph 2(2)(f)

- At the previous inspection, leaders had not ensured that there was a suitable programme in place for the youngest children to support their personal, social, emotional and physical development. As a result, not all pupils were well prepared for the next stage in their education.
- Leaders have now revised and strengthened their programme of activities for children in Reception. They work closely with staff from the associated private nursery to build carefully on children's learning and development. A topic approach helps children to develop their social and emotional understanding in a range of situations. There is a



strong focus on preparing them for Year 1.

■ This previously unmet standard is now met.

Paragraphs 1, 3(a), 3(c), 3(d), 3(e), 3(g)

- Previously, teachers' subject knowledge was variable and not all were using teaching and assessment strategies effectively to identify gaps and address misconceptions. Consequently, some pupils, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), were not progressing as quickly as they should.
- Leaders have ensured that all staff have received appropriate training to improve their subject knowledge. In addition, new subject plans, with suitable resources, support teachers to know what to teach and when. These plans build towards clear end points. A new curriculum leader is taking responsibility for planning and delivering additional support for those with SEND.
- Since the standard inspection, subject leaders have been appointed and trained. Leaders have provided these staff with allocated time to check that subject plans are being delivered consistently and effectively and that pupils are making the progress they should from their starting points. Weekly training opportunities have been put in place to enable sharing of best practice.
- These previously unmet standards are now met.
- The previously unmet standards in this part are now met.

Part 3. Welfare, health and safety of pupils

Paragraphs 7, 7(a), 7(b), 7(c), 32(1)(c)

- Leaders have ensured that all staff receive appropriate safeguarding training. Staff are made aware of local contextual risks. They know what to do if they have concerns about a pupil. Pupils say that they feel safe and well looked after. They say that they are taught about risks, including online.
- Leaders make all appropriate checks on staff suitability. Where checks are delayed, staff are supervised at all times.
- The safeguarding policy is updated in line with the most recent legislation and guidance. It is published on the school's website.
- These standards continue to be met.

Part 8. Quality of leadership in and management of schools

Paragraphs 34(1), 34(1)(a), 34(1)(b)

- Leaders have responded very positively to the outcomes of the last standard inspection. They have thought carefully about the actions to take to secure improvements and worked hard to implement these. As a result, the unmet standards from part 1 are now met. However, many of the actions are necessarily very recent, and leaders are clear that, as a result, the changes are not yet fully embedded. This means that they have not yet been able to review the impact of their work over time to ensure consistency.
- These standards remain unmet.

Not all of the standards and associated requirements were checked during this inspection.

Information about this school

- North Road Academy is an independent, mixed Muslim faith school for children aged four to 16.
- There is a separate nursery on the same site that is managed by the same proprietor which accepts children from age three years.
- Leaders do not make use of alternative provision.
- The most recent standard inspection took place in March 2023.



Information about this inspection

- This inspection was carried out at the request of the registration authority for independent schools. The purpose of the inspection was to monitor the progress the school has made in meeting the independent school standards and other requirements that it was judged to not comply with at its previous inspection.
- This was the first progress monitoring inspection since the standard inspection in March 2023.
- The inspector met throughout the day with the proprietor, who is also the headteacher, the head of secondary school and the head of primary school. The inspector also met with the early years lead and the curriculum lead.
- The inspector visited lessons in all year groups and spoke with pupils about their learning during these visits.
- The inspector met with children from Year 1 to Year 6 to discuss their learning.
- The inspector reviewed a range of documents, including the safeguarding policy, the curriculum policy and the subject curriculum plans.
