## Summary of key findings

### This provision meets requirements

- The manager describes how staff will take account of children's interests and provide a wide range of age-appropriate resources. She explains that children can make choices and independently self-select what they want to play with while at the club. She discusses how staff consider the individual needs of children, when planning activities, and adapt each activity.
- The manager explains how staff will role model positive behaviour. They will help children to manage their own feelings and learn to be respectful and considerate towards others.
- The manager discusses how staff will encourage children to wash their hands before they eat. Staff will discuss the impact that healthy foods can have on their bodies and the benefits of regular exercise.
- The manager understands her role to implement the safeguarding and welfare requirements. She discusses how staff will recognise and report any allegations of abuse, as well as wider safeguarding issues. The manager explains how staff will provide a safe and secure environment for children.
- The manager explains how staff will establish close relationships with parents from the start. She discusses the importance of sharing updates with parents about their children's experiences, such as through their daily discussions and regular emails.
- The manager understands the importance of making links with other partnerships to promote continuity of care. She explains staff liaise with other professionals, so that children can get the help they need.
- The manager explains there is a recruitment, induction, and supervision process to ensure staff are suitable to work with children. She understands the importance of holding regular meetings and providing targeted coaching and effective support to the staff team.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- This was the first routine inspection the provider received since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the provider and has taken that into account in their evaluation of the provider.
- The manager showed the inspector around the provision and explained how she organises the space and what activities are on offer for children.
- The manager discussed how the setting promotes children's welfare, learning and development and safeguarding with the inspector.
- The inspector sampled relevant documentation, including those relating to staff suitability, the staff's paediatric first-aid certificates, and public liability insurance documents.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
