What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

The childminder does not do enough to address breaches of requirements that have been raised at previous inspections. Although she has met some actions, she has not addressed the other weaknesses that were identified and further breaches have occurred. The childminder does not deal with weaknesses in practice promptly and effectively to raise standards. Therefore, children do not receive the support that they need to keep them safe and the childminder does not offer them sufficient challenge in their learning. Although the childminder has sought some support from other professionals since her last inspection, this has not had the desired impact. She continues to lack a clear understanding of her role and responsibilities.

Despite previous concerns raised about the lack of support for children's communication and language development, this continues to be an area of weakness. The childminder does not know how to interact and engage with children to promote their language skills further, instead she simply watches the children in silence while they play. In addition, the childminder's understanding of child protection is weak. She does not know when she should report concerns about children's welfare which puts children's safety at risk.

Despite the weaknesses in support for children's learning and development, children form secure attachments with the childminder. They are settled in the childminder's care, they know the routines and behave well.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Since her last inspection, the childminder has taken some action. She has updated her paediatric first-aid training and keeps an accurate record of children's daily attendance. Despite the childminder also creating a safeguarding statement, she still does not have a good enough understanding of key aspects. For example, she does not have a good enough understanding of how to recognise when a child may be at risk and does not know the procedures she should follow to keep children safe. Furthermore, she does not know what she should do if an allegation was made about her or a member of her family.
- The childminder has not made effective use of professional development opportunities to raise the quality of the service that she provides. She does not have an up-to-date knowledge and understanding of how children learn, or how to promote children's development further. This is despite similar weaknesses being raised at her previous inspection. As a result, the childminder does not have a clear understanding of her roles and responsibilities.
- The childminder does not do enough to support children's communication and language development. Furthermore, her interactions with children are weak and



infrequent. When the childminder does interact with children, these occasions are not meaningful and do not benefit children. For instance, while she comments on what they are doing, she does not model language well or encourage children to develop their vocabulary. Children lack the challenge and support that they need to help them to make good enough progress.

- The childminder does not provide a curriculum that offers children appropriate challenge, to help them to make progress in their learning. She aims to use children's interests to promote their learning. However, she does not understand how to implement this, as she plays alongside children and does not recognise how to extend children's learning. As a result, children lose interest and do not receive the challenge that they need. For instance, she only allows children to have access to limited resources and this sometimes hinders their opportunities to extend imaginative play. Furthermore, when children hold scissors incorrectly to cut dough, she praises them and does not help them to learn how to hold them properly.
- The childminder provides children with opportunities to explore the local community and mix with other children and adults. For example, she attends local groups and takes children on trips to soft-play sessions and on walks to feed the fish and ducks at a local park.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

There is not an open and positive culture around safeguarding that puts children's interests first.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:
