Introduction

The inspection was carried out by three Additional Inspectors.

Description of the school

Millennium is an inner city primary school of above average size. It opened five years ago when it was re-sited as part of the Greenwich peninsula rejuvenation project. The school attracts pupils from a wide mix of council, social and private housing. The percentage of pupils eligible for free school meals is above average. An above average number of pupils are from minority ethnic groups and speak English as an additional language. The proportion of pupils with learning difficulties is about average, but the number of pupils with statements is above average. The school has a special designated provision for six children on the autistic spectrum.

Teaching and learning

Grade:

The quality of teaching and learning is consistently good. In the Foundation Stage group activities and resources are well planned to meet different needs and motivate pupils to enjoy their learning. Teaching in Years 1 to 6 is good overall and includes examples of outstanding practice. Teachers have a good understanding of how pupils learn and provide them with a good range of opportunities to listen, observe and investigate for themselves. This was seen to particularly good effect in a Year 6 mathematics lesson in which the pupils made excellent progress in problem-solving. Teachers' questions deepen pupils' understanding and good use is made of the school's target-setting and assessment systems. The school recognised that there was an issue with mathematics subject knowledge last year due to the absences of key teachers. This impacted adversely on test results and is now being addressed well through the school's effective monitoring systemsPupils are invariably eager learners and behave well. Their positive attitudes make a significant contribution to the improving standards in the school. Pupils with learning difficulties, and those learning English as an additional language, receive good support that enables them to progress well. Support staff are well trained and play an integral part in contributing to pupils' learning in lessons.

Curriculum and other activities

Grade:

The curriculum is good with some very strong features. The planning and evaluation of the curriculum, and the way that this is linked with staff training and development, are very effective. It is well organised and offers opportunities for pupils to learn about a particular focus through a variety of other subjects, linking them well. Teachers make good use of the local environment as starting points for teaching pupils about what affects the local area and what can be done to improve it. The curriculum provides opportunities for all pupils to join in extra sessions of sport and exercise through the good dinnertime and after school clubs such as dance, football, athletics, gymnastics and cheer-leading. Staff encourage pupils' creative skills and this is reflected in high quality art and display work. The school is a 'Creative Partnership School' and resident artists inspire the children they work with. Approaches to learning match the needs of all pupils including those whose first language is not English and those who have learning difficulties.

Care, guidance and support

Grade:

Inspection evidence supports the views of the overwhelming majority of parents that Millennium School provides very good care and guidance for their children. The premises are safe, secure, clean and welcoming. Effective arrangements for child protection are in place. Staff have been well trained and are fully aware of their responsibilities in this area. Relationships are good and pupils know to whom they might turn if in difficulty or distress. They are confident that any bullying is quickly sorted out. Many outside agencies are also available to give their support as and when it is needed. Teachers provide pupils with clear guidance about their performance and how they can improve. Assessment of pupils is good across the whole curriculum. This information is used carefully to plan their next steps in learning, keep a check on progress and set targets.
