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#### Introduction

The inspection was carried out by two Additional Inspectors.

## **Description of the school**

This is a small school in an affluent area of Chelsea. Its pupils, however, come from a wide range of social backgrounds. The percentage of pupils from minority ethnic backgrounds and those who have English as an additional language is above average. The percentage of pupils with learning difficulties is broadly average. Pupil mobility is increasing, particularly in Year 5 when significant numbers of pupils leave for the independent sector.

## Teaching and learning

#### Grade:

Teachers have very high expectations of their pupils. They set challenging tasks and ensure that all pupils achieve as well as they can. For example, in an English lesson Year 6 pupils developed an excellent understanding of how to write a persuasive letter. Teachers motivate pupils to learn in many different ways. The excellent use of humour helped Year 6 pupils to make very good progress in their understanding of how to conduct a safe experiment. Teachers make very good use of laptop computers and interactive whiteboards to enhance pupils' learning in all areas of the curriculum. Homework is set in all year groups and is linked very well to the work done in class. One parent wrote that her four year old daughter is 'very excited by her weekly homework assignment'. Teachers make very good use of praise to celebrate pupils' success. As a result, pupils develop high levels of confidence and make excellent progress as they move through the school. Support staff are very well trained and play an integral part in contributing to pupils' learning. Recent improvements in the school's assessment systems, particularly in English, are helping teachers to make very good use of success criteria to show pupils know what they have done well and what they need to do to improve.

#### **Curriculum and other activities**

#### Grade:

The school provides a rich curriculum that effectively meets pupils' needs. Improvements in the planning of English have helped to raise the standards of more able pupils. Personal, social and health education is central to the ethos of the school, and pupils have very good opportunities to learn how to be responsible citizens. Children in the Foundation Stage benefit from features such as a massage programme and also have excellent access to new outside play facilities where they can develop their social and creative skills. Learning is enhanced by an excellent programme of visits to places such as the Chelsea Physic Garden and the Hindu Temple at Neasden. Music is taught by a specialist teacher and the school's choir performs locally as well as in prestigious diocesan events such as Prom Praise in the Royal Albert Hall. Across the school there are very good opportunities for after-school clubs, including Spanish, chess and dance, to enrich pupils' experiences. There is very good provision for pupils with special educational needs and for those with English as an additional language. The Motivation Station provides support and a quiet place for pupils to complete their homework.


#### Care, guidance and support

#### **Grade:**

The care provided for pupils is excellent. Pupils feel safe and secure. Very good induction arrangements, for example, help the youngest pupils settle into school life. Parents are unanimous in praising this aspect of the school's work. One parent wrote 'quite simply, the school is a diamond in the middle of London'. Pupils also express confidence that they have an adult to talk with should they feel the need to discuss personal matters. Child protection procedures are robust and widely understood. The school works very well with outside agencies to ensure that pupils with specific learning and personal difficulties receive the best support. Health and safety routines and risk assessment are very good. Pupils' academic and personal development is carefully monitored and, as a result, their needs are met very effectively.

## Text from letter to pupils explaining the findings of the inspection
