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### Introduction

The inspection was carried out by two Additional Inspectors.

## **Description of the school**

Macaulay Primary School is a voluntary aided Church of England school in Clapham. The school is about the same size as other primary schools and is heavily oversubscribed. Pupils are from a wide range of ethnic backgrounds. Although the percentage whose first language is not English is above average, very few are at an early stage of learning English. A significant number of pupils join the school at other than the usual time. The social and economic circumstances of families are broadly average. The percentage of pupils with learning difficulties and disabilities is above average but the number with a statement of special educational need is similar to most schools. The school has gained Investors in People status, been awarded the Basic Skills Quality Mark, Department for Education and Science (DFES) awards for improvement and most recently the Silver Artsmark Award.

## Teaching and learning

#### Grade:

Teaching is good and, as a result, pupils learn well in their lessons. Staff work effectively together and the wide range of pupils' learning needs are generally well met. Planning identifies different challenges for pupils, but strategies to ensure that more able pupils achieve the higher levels of which they are capable are not consistently delivered. Relationships between teachers and pupils are generally excellent.

There are examples of outstanding teaching, particularly in the Foundation Stage. Here, teaching assistants help to promote the children's independent learning and ensure that all pupils participate fully. A positive ethos of reward and celebration makes learning fun.

Assessment arrangements are good and are used well to monitor pupils' progress and help teacher's planning. Teachers ensure that pupils know how well they are doing and how they can improve. Interactive whiteboards are used very effectively to support pupils' learning, but teachers do not provide sufficient opportunities for pupils to use computers.

#### **Curriculum and other activities**

#### Grade:

The school's curriculum meets the needs of most pupils and there is a strong focus on personal, social and health education. However, there is insufficient challenge in some of the tasks for the more able pupils. The provision in the Foundation Stage is well organised with an emphasis on learning through play.

The curriculum is enhanced well by enrichment activities that increase pupils' enjoyment of education. Many visits take place, including residential courses that build confidence and teamwork, and visitors from the local community work with pupils. Local clergy regularly contribute to assemblies. Parents are actively involved with events such as World Book Day. Extra-curricular clubs are popular, especially in sport. Support with reading is carried out by volunteer adults and a writing club is specifically aimed to boost the standards of gifted and talented pupils.

## Care, guidance and support

#### **Grade:**

The school provides an outstanding level of care, guidance and support that leads to excellent personal development. It carefully considers the learning needs of all pupils, although there is not always enough challenge in the work for those of higher ability. Pupil's personal and academic progress is monitored well, assessed and, increasingly, is used to plan the next stage of development and provide them with good feedback. Parents appreciate the good communication from school. One parent wrote, 'I feel the pastoral care is second to none. The teachers truly care about the welfare of the children; they treat them as individuals and take great care of their personal needs'.

The school has created an exceptionally warm, friendly, learning environment in which pupils feel safe and can develop their individual talents. The 'buddy' system of older pupils caring for younger pupils also encourages good manners, good behaviour, and safe and co-operative play. Pupils say that 'the teachers are kind and friendly' and they like the 'buddies' because 'they listen to us and look after us'. Arrangements for child protection are secure and risk assessments for continued pupil safety are efficiently carried out. The wide range of enrichment opportunities enhances and develops pupils' confidence and independence, and effectively prepares them for their next stage of learning.
