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Introduction

The inspection was carried out by three Additional Inspectors.

Description of the school

Cayley Primary is a larger than an average school. Nearly 95 per cent of the pupils are from a Bangladeshi background. The vast majority of pupils have English as an additional language. The proportion of pupils with learning difficulties and disabilities is above average. The percentage of pupils eligible for free school meals is well above average. Children's attainment on entry to the Nursery is well below average with language skills being particularly low.

Quality of provision

Teaching and learning

Grade:

Outstanding teaching and learning contributes significantly to pupils' exceptional achievement. Teachers have high expectations of learning and pupils respond very well to these. Enthusiastic teaching and strong subject knowledge inspires and motivates pupils. Instructions and explanations are exceptionally clear so pupils know what they are expected to learn. Interactive white boards are used effectively to present teaching points in a visual and interesting way. One parent wrote, 'I am impressed with the teaching methods especially the use of whiteboards'. Pupils have excellent opportunities to talk in pairs and express their ideas. This effectively develops their speaking and listening skills. Skilful questioning by teachers challenges pupils' thinking and checks their understanding. One pupil commented, 'Mathematics is fun because the teacher asks us tricky questions'. Assessment is very good because teachers use data to plan tasks which are very well matched to pupils' abilities and needs. As a result, all pupils are suitably challenged; they show high levels of concentration and are productive learners, taking pride in presenting their work. High quality support is targeted to pupils who need it so they have full access to activities and make outstanding progress. Teaching assistants and specialist teachers provide additional support to pupils at an early stage of English language. The marking of pupils' work is effective.

Curriculum and other activities

Grade:

The school provides a very stimulating curriculum which promotes enjoyment, high achievement and outstanding personal development. It is very well tailored to meet the needs of all pupils, particularly in English. There is a clear focus on developing basic skills, with speaking and listening developed well in all subjects. Investigative and problem solving skills are promoted extremely well in mathematics and science. Interesting and relevant links between subjects make learning meaningful for pupils. For example, after a visit to Benjamin Franklin's house, Year 5 pupils applied their art, literacy and research skills in presenting high quality work on the scientist's life and work. ICT skills are taught systematically and pupils use these to support their learning in other subjects. A well resourced library promotes a love of books and develops pupils' research skills. Healthy lifestyles and personal safety receive good attention. An excellent range of clubs are on offer including athletics, Bengali and drama. These are popular and appreciated by pupils and parents. Provision for music is excellent and the choir's performance

of songs from 'Oliver' was of high quality. A residential visit extends pupils' studies in science and provides good opportunities to develop teamwork and problem solving skills.

Care, guidance and support

Grade:

Pupils receive outstanding care, guidance and support. This is a school where every child matters. Child protection and health and safety procedures are rigorous and ensure the safety and well being of all pupils. Excellent induction arrangements help children settle quickly into school. Where appropriate, outside agencies effectively support the school in meeting the needs of pupils, particularly those with learning difficulties and disabilities. Very good assessment procedures enable the staff to keep track of pupils' progress and to set challenging targets for them. Parents are kept well informed of their child's academic and personal development and are given very good advice and support on how to help their child at home. Learning mentors provide effective guidance and support for both pupils and their families.
