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Introduction

The inspection was carried out by three Additional Inspectors.

Description of the school

This is a larger-than-average primary school, which draws its pupils from quite a wide area of Barnet. The school serves a mixed community but very few pupils are entitled to free school meals. The vast majority of pupils are White and most of these are of British origin. An increasing minority of pupils come from a variety of ethnic backgrounds. Very few pupils speak English as an additional language. The proportion of pupils with learning difficulties is broadly average. Attainment on entry is broadly average. A new headteacher was appointed in September 2005.

Quality of provision

Teaching and learning

Grade:

The quality of teaching and learning is good overall. It has improved significantly over the current school year and is outstanding in some lessons. Teachers have good relationships with pupils and manage their classes well. They are beginning to use the new interactive technology effectively to engage and motivate pupils. As a result, most pupils behave well and have positive attitudes to learning. Where teaching is particularly effective, the teachers approach is enthusiastic and they present challenging activities to pupils of all abilities. This was evident in a Year 3/4 mathematics lesson, where pupils deepened their understanding because of the teacher's challenging questions and opportunities to discuss and continually refine their ideas. Most teachers set pupils challenging targets and give them a clear idea of how to improve their work. Some inconsistencies remain, however. In a few lessons, teachers do not use a sufficient variety of strategies and do not give all pupils enough opportunities to contribute and discuss their ideas in order to consolidate their learning.

Curriculum and other activities

Grade:

The curriculum is good and ensures that pupils of all abilities achieve well. Provision for basic skills is particularly successful and those with learning difficulties and disabilities are supported well by special needs teachers and the skilled team of teaching assistants. An increasingly effective range of strategies is being used to support those in danger of underachieving. This year, links between different subjects are developing and there are interesting plans in place to make the curriculum more exciting and creative for next year. ICT is used very effectively to support pupils' learning in other subjects. All aspects of pupils' personal and social development are prominent features of the curriculum. A good range of enrichment is provided through visits and visitors to the school and through a variety of sporting, musical and other additional activities. French adds richness and challenge to the curriculum for older pupils. Events such as the recent project on the history of the school brought the curriculum alive and involved the whole school community.


Care, guidance and support

Grade:

The school provides good care, guidance and support for pupils, within a strong Christian framework. Provision is exemplary in several respects and this enables pupils to feel secure and cared for within a community where they are fully included and valued. Health and safety procedures are regularly reviewed and potential risks are carefully assessed. Arrangements for the safeguarding of children are good and understood by all staff. Adults give learners confidence and enable them to enjoy all aspects of school life. Support for pupils with learning difficulties and disabilities, is well organised and meets their needs. The school is developing good systems for monitoring academic progress although the marking of pupils' work is inconsistent. Pupils are taught how to take care of themselves and to make healthy and safe choices. The school has a productive partnership with parents who feel that their children are safe and well cared for at school and that their views are taken into account. The many positive comments included 'my son has learnt how to be sociable, helpful, and friendly and is very good at his literacy and mathematics.'

Pupils
