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Introduction

The inspection was carried out by an Additional Inspector.

Description of the school

West Leigh Junior is a much larger than average primary school. It serves the local area but has an increasing number of pupils from out of the catchment area. It is very popular and always oversubscribed. Almost all pupils are of White British backgrounds with a small number of minority ethnic pupils. Attainment on entry is above average. Pupils come from relatively advantaged backgrounds. The numbers of children eligible for free school meals and who have learning difficulties or disabilities are much lower than those found nationally. The school is well known locally and nationally for its high standards in music and swimming.

Grade: 1

The school is correct in judging itself to be outstanding. Pupils receive an excellent education which combines achieving exceptionally high standards with the enjoyment of a wide range of learning opportunities. There are two key factors in the school's continued success. First, the headteacher's and senior team's attention to detail within their excellent leadership and management and, second, the strong team work amongst staff. Its mission statement '..... that we will all be happy and successful', is met very well. This mission is evident in the outstanding care, guidance and support provided. Even though this is a large school, pupils are known well by all staff and say they are totally confident that someone will 'deal with' any concerns. Attendance is very good because they love coming to a school where they feel happy and secure. Pupils' personal development is outstanding. Their behaviour is excellent and good manners commendable. Through their various responsibilities, membership of choirs and the schoolcouncil and running clubs, pupils make an outstanding contribution to the school and local community. They attain very high standards in English and mathematics which, coupled with very good social and team-work skills, prepare them very well for their future.

The excellent curriculum means that teachers link subjects to make learning relevant and fun. Consequently, pupils are very keen to learn and through a good programme of personal, social and health education, develop a good understanding of how to keep safe and lead a healthy lifestyle. The school has very limited space for physical education activities but makes full use of its swimming pool and local parks to ensure pupils build up their fitness and stamina levels. The very good number of clubs, ranging from the Beano club to learning Mandarin contributes significantly to pupils' enjoyment of their school day. The school provides high quality opportunities for more able pupils and excellent teaching and support for those with learning difficulties. Consequently, pupils of all abilities make exceptional progress as they move through the school. By Year 6, standards are consistently exceptionally high. The outstanding academic guidance provided underpins the consistently good and often excellent teaching. As one parent wrote ' .. the established teaching staff are second to none - dedicated, caring and always willing to speak to parents and take action as necessary'. Teachers know what their pupils need to learn next to move them on in their learning and plan together in year teams to make lessons memorable and enjoyable. Pupils' work is always marked thoroughly, although there is some inconsistency in the way their personal targets for improvement are set and reviewed. The school's evaluation of its work is astute at all levels so that planning for further improvement is very clearly focused. Even though the last inspection judged the school to be 'very good' and there were no areas for improvement noted, there has been no complacency. Indeed, current standards are even higher and the learning opportunities much broader. The school provides very good value for money and the capacity for further improvement is excellent.

What the school should do to improve further

 Develop and refine further the system for setting and reviewing pupils' personal learning targets.

Achievement and standards

Grade: 1

Pupils make excellent progress. By Year 6, standards have been consistently exceptionally high in English, mathematics and science. Standards in music, swimming, French and information and communication technology (ICT) are also very high. Achievement is outstanding. The school tracks pupils' progress systematically to ensure they are provided with the right support and teaching to help them do as well as possible. West Leigh Junior is far more successful than most schools in helping pupils who start the school at below average levels to attain good standards by Year 6 and, similarly, those who start above average, to attain exceptionally high standards.

Pupils achieve particularly high standards in English due to the strong links between subjects which provide interesting and meaningful opportunities for writing.

Personal development and well-being

Grade: 1

Attendance is very good. Pupils enjoy coming to school and involve themselves enthusiastically in all that it has to offer. Their spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is exceptional. They flourish through the respect, care and consideration shown to them by adults and as a result they show outstanding levels of respect and care towards each other. This is especially noticeable in their impressive behaviour in the cramped playground. The school provides many and various opportunties for pupils to take responsibility and develop self-discipline. Pupils of all ages take their responsibilities seriously. For example, members of the lower school boys' choir arrive early for school for choir practice. Year 6 pupils delight in the responsibility of being in the 'playground squad' of helpers or a 'book buddy' for Year 3. Their involvement in 'Enterprise week' provides first hand experiences to learn how to run a profitable business.

Quality of provision

Teaching and learning

Grade: 1

The inspection confirms the school's judgement that the quality of teaching is never less than good and is often outstanding. Pupils would not be achieving so well and attaining such high standards unless this was the case. Throughout the school, there is a very positive learning atmosphere. A short visit to any classroom shows competent and skilful teachers who enjoy their work. Relationships are excellent between adults and pupils. Key features of teaching are very high expectations, brisk pace and lively lesson content. Consequently, pupils listen carefully to their teachers and are keen to work hard. Teaching for pupils who have learning difficulties is excellent because it provides many practical experiences to reinforce learning and ensure success as well as good self-esteem. Specialist teaching for ICT, French and music is very successful and results in very high standards.

Curriculum and other activities

Grade: 1

The curriculum is outstanding and complemented by a notable range of clubs. It meets all statutory requirements and offers a much wider range of interesting and exciting activities than is usually found. The school achieves this in part by linking subjects. The strong team work is evident in the innovative ideas for lessons.

Care, guidance and support

Grade: 1

Care, guidance and support are outstanding and underpin the work of the school and pupils' success. Arrangements for safeguarding pupils are robust and comply with the latest government requirements. The very good liaison with the infant school ensures pupils settle in quickly and build on their previous learning. Similarly, good links with local secondary schools mean that pupils are helped to make a smooth transition to the next stage of their education. The school's system for tracking pupils' progress is used extremely well to make sure they reach challenging targets and make consistent, good progress. Very good links with parents means that they are well informed about school events, how well their child is doing and what they can do to help at home.

Leadership and management

Grade: 1

Leadership and management are outstanding. The headteacher has encouraged and developed effective teamwork throughout the school. The collective strengths of the senior leadership team set an excellent example. The headteacher and two deputies have a detailed understanding of the quality of teaching and learning, what the data from tests and tracking tells them and how well the school is looking after its pupils. They make perceptive use of all this information when planning for further improvement. The senior team set very high expectations for staff to ensure that all pupils achieve as well as possible and they support them extremely well in doing this. For example, even though there is high quality teaching across the school, lessons are checked regularly and rigorously and staff are given suggestions for improvement and good ideas are shared. Termly planning is organised by one deputy, giving year group teams more time to concentrate on planning good learning opportunities for individual lessons. West Leigh Junior is clearly a very successful school; nevertheless the headteacher and staff are always seeking to improve the quality of education and care it provides. Staff are positively encouraged to attend courses to extend their knowledge.

Governors give the headteacher and staff their full support and challenge them to strive for further improvements.
