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## Introduction

The inspection was carried out by one Additional Inspector.

The inspector evaluated the overall effectiveness of the school and investigated the following issues: standards and achievement, teaching and learning, and leadership and management. Evidence was gathered from the school's self-evaluation; national published assessment data; the school's own assessment records, policies and minutes; observation of the school at work; interviews with senior members of staff and pupils; and the parents' questionnaires. Other aspects of the school's work were not investigated in detail, but the inspector found no evidence to suggest that the school's own assessments, as given in the self-evaluation, were not justified, and these have been included where appropriate in the report.

# **Description of the school**

This average size primary school serves a socially diverse urban area. The proportion of pupils entitled to free school meals is below average. The number of pupils from ethnic minority backgrounds is below average; few of these have English as an additional language. Above average numbers of pupils have learning difficulties and/or disabilities, although none has a statement of special educational needs. The school holds Investors in People status and has twice been awarded the School's Achievement Award. The school has Healthy Schools status and has been awarded the Basic Skills Quality Mark on three occasions. The school has also gained the Schools Curriculum Award.

## Overall effectiveness of the school

#### Grade: 1

This is an outstanding school. The dynamic and dedicated leadership of the headteacher encourages outstanding levels of teamwork which bring the school's mission statement to life: 'No matter how well we do we can always do better.'

The pursuit of improvement is relentless. It ensures that pupils make outstanding progress in their academic and personal development. The care, guidance and support the school offers are outstanding. They ensure that pupils work and play in a secure and nurturing environment. The use of assessment is exemplary enabling the school to track each pupil's progress so that everyone achieves to their full potential. Parents value the school highly. 'My children love going to this excellent school. It cares for them at all times and is instilling in them a love of learning,' was a typical comment. The school has made outstanding progress since the previous inspection. It offers outstanding value for money.

From starting points which are below average, pupils make outstanding progress as they move up through the school because outstanding teaching and an outstanding, innovative curriculum work together to make lessons both demanding and enjoyable. 'Our teachers are great. They make lessons really interesting and fun for us. I love our topic work because we get the chance to follow up our own ideas!' said one pupil enthusiastically. By the end of Year 2 standards are consistently above average in reading, writing and mathematics. By the end of Year 6 standards in national tests in English, mathematics and science are always above average and often well above average. In the 2007 tests in English nearly all pupils gained the expected level while in mathematics and science everyone did so, with above average numbers gaining the higher levels. The school's astute use of its strong team of teaching assistants supports teaching very effectively ensuring that all pupils, including those with learning difficulties and/or disabilities, make outstanding progress.

Pupils enjoy coming to school as seen in their above average attendance levels and their happy, smiling faces. They are welcoming to visitors. They are courteous and inquisitive. Pupils have a very clear understanding of right and wrong. They are knowledgeable and respectful of other religions and cultures. They know what they need to do to lead healthy lifestyles and what foods are good for them. Large numbers participate in the extensive range of sporting enrichment activities. Pupils say that staff are approachable and always ready to listen. Pupils comment favourably on how respectfully and fairly adults treat them. Pupils feel safe in school and trust adults to help them sort out any problems. The active school council has brought about significant improvements to playground facilities. Older pupils enjoy the responsibilities of being made prefects and helping younger pupils. By providing pupils with high levels of basic skills and high levels of self-esteem the school is giving them an excellent foundation for future success.

The outstanding leadership of the headteacher gives the school a clear vision of where the school is going and how it is to get there. Expectations are high and have become the norm underpinning all its work. The school's evaluation of its own effectiveness is highly accurate. Procedures for self-evaluation are thorough and take into account the opinions of a wide range of stakeholders including parents and pupils. As a consequence, everyone feels that the identified areas for improvement are important. They are incorporated into the high quality school development plan which includes rigorous success criteria and dates for reviews and completion. Complacency is not a word that exists in this school's vocabulary. Because of this the school is

constantly seeking ways to improve. This unceasing pursuit of excellence is giving the school outstanding capacity to build on its present success and improve even further.

# **Effectiveness of the Foundation Stage**

#### Grade: 1

Children get off to an excellent start in the Reception class. From starting points which are below those typical for their age when they enter, children make outstanding progress to attain skills which are above age-related expectations by the time they enter Year 1. Such strong progress is brought about by highly skilled teaching which provides the children with an exceptional range of activities, both indoors and outdoors, to stimulate their interest and help them to develop their skills as inquisitive and independent learners. The Foundation Stage is led and managed outstandingly well. This ensures that the excellent facilities and resources are used to maximum effect to support children's learning and to provide a safe and stimulating environment for learning and play.

## What the school should do to improve further

The school is fully aware of what it needs to do to improve even further so no additional issues need to be identified.
