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#### Introduction

The inspection was carried out by an Additional Inspector.

The inspector evaluated the overall effectiveness of the school and investigated the following issues:

- the achievement of higher attaining pupils
- if there is any difference in the attainment of boys and girls
- whether teachers have high enough expectations of how well pupils achieve.

Evidence was gathered from performance data, observations of teaching and reviewing work produced by pupils. Parents' questionnaires and discussions with a group of governors, staff and parents also contributed to the judgements. Other aspects of the school's work were not investigated in detail, but the inspector found no evidence to suggest that the school's own assessments, as given in its self-evaluation, were not justified, and these have been included where appropriate in this report.

## **Description of the school**

This over-subscribed average sized infant school serves the village of Old Basing. About a quarter of the pupils come from the surrounding area. The social circumstances of most pupils are above those typically found. Almost all the pupils are of White British heritage. The proportion with a learning difficulty or disability is average. The school has achieved Investors in People status and has gained the National Healthy Schools Award.

### Overall effectiveness of the school

#### Grade: 1

Old Basing Infants is an outstanding school in which pupils thrive in both their personal and academic development. The school prepares pupils exceptionally well for their move to the junior school. Parents are overwhelmingly supportive and almost all say that their children enjoy school, are safe and they make good progress. Many parents rightly commented on the positive and supportive ethos that encourages the pupils to achieve outstandingly well. All the adults support pupils well, treat them as individuals and ensure that they reach high standards. Parents' views were encapsulated in the comment, 'The school has a positive work ethic which is supported through recognition of achievement. This takes place in a disciplined, yet caring environment which actively encourages learning and fun'. The curriculum is outstanding and contributes to the pupils' enjoyment exceptionally well. A parent rightly commented, 'The school encourages the children to learn well using interesting ways to develop their skills'. The curriculum is rich and broad and encourages effective learning because teachers set high quality activities that are given a purpose and are made relevant. One means of doing this is the creative manner in which teachers link subjects. For example, in the recent robot week, which had a design and technology focus, the pupils were excited when they explained how they designed, made and evaluated robots. They talked animatedly about the poems and stories they had written and the robot dance and music sessions led by a specialist teacher. Other teachers used good quality programs on the computer linked to the theme. All of the resulting work was displayed in an attractive manner. This helped to boost the pupils' self-esteem as they delighted in pointing out photographs of their robots. The week culminated in a celebration assembly. This approach made learning real and contributed well to developing pupils' very positive attitudes to learning and each other. Such positive attitudes are reflected in the high levels of attendance.

Because the quality of teaching and learning is excellent and staff ensure that work set matches pupils' needs well, they make excellent progress. Teachers have high expectations of what the pupils can achieve. They have excellent relationships with pupils and manage them well. This engenders rapid learning. As one pupil said, 'Our teachers make learning fun and we give us really hard work and we like that.' Teachers' high demands, when linked to the fast pace of learning and very good use of resources such as interactive white boards ensures that lesson objectives are met. In the past, the progress of more able pupils, although good, was not as strong as others. In addition, the performance of girls was not as strong as boys. These differences have been removed. All groups make excellent progress in reading, writing and mathematics and current Year 2 pupils are on course to attain exceptionally high standards. Almost all pupils gain the expected levels in reading, writing and mathematics and a majority exceed the expectations for their age. Good assessment procedures ensure that any pupils that fall behind or have particular learning needs are identified quickly and effective programmes are put into place to ensure excellent progress towards targets set.

Pupils' personal development, including their spiritual, moral, social and cultural development, is outstanding. Behaviour is excellent. Pupils develop an excellent understanding of how to stay safe and what constitutes a healthy lifestyle because the personal, social and health education programme is very effective. 'We need milk', proudly stated one Year 2 boy, 'Because it provides calcium to make our bones and teeth strong.' In addition, pupils enjoy taking responsibility. School councillors, for example, take their role seriously and are proud of the changes that they have suggested such as extending the games available during lunchtimes.

They also enjoy choosing charities for which they raise money such as 'Save the Children' and NSPCC.

Parents are pleased with the way that the school cares for their children. All safeguarding and child protection arrangements are fully met. Academic guidance is excellent. Pupils' progress is tracked closely and pupils are very clear about how to achieve the targets set for them because marking is of good quality.

The school fully deserves its good reputation within the community. High quality leadership and management lie at the heart of the school's success. The headteacher continues to provide excellent leadership. She is supported well by the deputy head and senior leadership team. The excellent self-evaluation processes, in which all staff with responsibilities are directly involved, enable leaders to have a pin-point knowledge of strengths and weaknesses. These systems not only provide good means to check provision and progress, but also are used well to establish improvement priorities and inform the good quality development plan. Staff, including the support staff, work closely as a team to make sure that all pupils, whatever their starting points, achieve well. The positive impact of leadership and management demonstrate an excellent capacity for further improvement. This can be seen in the excellent improvement in the provision for gifted and talented pupils which was a weakness in the previous inspection.

Governance is excellent. Governors are committed to further improvement, are not complacent and they have an excellent and astute understanding of the school's position. This is because they are directly involved in monitoring the school's provision by having regular visits to the school. They are supportive, yet challenge the school to do better.

## **Effectiveness of the Foundation Stage**

#### Grade: 1

The Foundation Stage unit caters for the needs of the children outstandingly well. Children are exceptionally well cared for and staff expectations for children's progress are high particularly in their personal, social and emotional development. Children thoroughly enjoy learning and parents say that they settle well and quickly become confident. Activities are stimulating and challenging and meticulously planned and assessed. Recent changes to the curriculum organisation now ensures that there is a good balance provided between those activities that are planned by staff and those chosen by children. Children enter school with skills that are above those typically found and they make excellent progress, particularly in their social and communication, language and literacy skills. By the time that they leave almost all attain the expected goals and a majority exceed them. However, although the outdoor learning space is used well, its use is limited because there is no cover.

# What the school should do to improve further

Provide cover outside the three Reception classrooms.
