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Introduction

The inspection was carried out by one of Her Majesty's Inspectors.

The inspector evaluated the overall effectiveness of the school and investigated the following issues: pupils' academic progress; the organisation, planning, teaching and assessment of mixed age classes; the accuracy of the school's self-evaluation. Evidence was gathered from a range of documentation, especially planning and monitoring documents, observation of lessons, discussions with staff and pupils, and from parents' written comments. There was no detailed investigation of other aspects of the school's work, but the inspector found no evidence to suggest that the school's own assessments, as given in its self-evaluation, were not justified, and these have been included where appropriate in this report.

Description of the school

Elmsett Church of England Primary is a very small village school that serves the local community and surrounding villages. The proportion of pupils who are eligible for free school meals is below average, but the proportion that have special educational need is around average. Pupils come from average social circumstances and from homes where English is the main language spoken. There are no pupils learning English as an additional language. The school has won many awards including the Healthy Schools Award, a School Achievement Award and an ECO Award.

Overall effectiveness of the school

Grade: 1

Elmsett Primary school is an outstanding school. Children's attainment on entry is mostly average but, by the time they leave school at the end of Year 6, standards have normally risen to above or well above average in English, mathematics and science. For many pupils this represents excellent progress. Those who have learning difficulties or disabilities often make outstanding progress and the gifted and talented are provided with many opportunities to extend their achievement. In most other subjects, achievement is also very good; it is outstanding in art due mainly to some effective specialist teaching. Pupils' skills in information and communication technology (ICT) are sound but their achievement across a range of ICT experiences is not as well developed because the curriculum is too narrow and skills-focussed.

The school rightly judges the overall quality of its teaching to be good. The Foundation Stage gets pupils off to a good start by encouraging children to be thinking, independent learners. Across the rest of the school, teaching and learning are good because teachers know each child's strengths and weaknesses very well. This means they can plan the curriculum carefully to meet their individual needs. Teachers are experienced at planning for mixed age and mixed ability classes and do so carefully because each class shares a number of teachers. This works satisfactorily but the school is aware that in the current year the numbers of teachers used was too great; this has been reduced for the coming year. The use of specialist teachers of some subjects, such as art and physical education, is very effective. The many teaching assistants and higher level teaching assistants also make a significant contribution to learning. The curriculum is good and caters for the needs of all within a strong sense of individual need. A wide range of extra curricular activities, languages, visits and visitors enhances it.

Pupils' behaviour is outstanding and their personal development is excellent. No child has been excluded for many years. Their spiritual, moral, cultural and social development is exceptional and underpinned by a strong focus on support from and for the community, both within and outside the school. Pupils enjoy school very much and attendance is excellent; they feel they have many opportunities to contribute to life in the school. Partnership with parents and a wide range of other organisations is extremely effective in promoting pupils' development. Parents are overwhelmingly supportive of the school. As one put it, 'I doubt if I could find a better school for my child'.

The school maintains outstanding levels of care. Pupils understand what makes healthy living through diet and exercise and receive good guidance on how to stay safe and look after themselves. They are beginning to understand the levels at which they are working and are clear about targets for the next stage of learning because their academic progress is monitored carefully.

The leadership and management of the school are outstanding. The governing body provides good support and monitors the school's performance appropriately. The new headteacher provides excellent leadership. The school's self-evaluation is accurate and identifies the key priorities for development, which are recorded in a well structured school development plan. There has been a good rate of improvement since the last inspection and the school currently demonstrates good capacity to improve further.

Effectiveness of the Foundation Stage

Grade: 2

The Foundation Stage has been managed well though a period of staff change in recent years. Nearly all pupils in the main school have attended the playgroup and transition is very smooth. Partnership with the playgroup is very effective. In Reception, children therefore settle well and quickly into routines. Teaching and learning are good and there is a good emphasis on developing skills across a range of competencies. The curriculum is sound with some stimulating activities but, though the outside area is used effectively, it is small and lacks cover, so is limited in its ability to provide pupils with enhanced curriculum activities. Plans to provide cover are in place.
