## Introduction

The inspection was carried out by two additional inspectors.

## **Description of the school**

This is a small primary school. Children in the Early Years Foundation Stage are taught in a mixed Reception/Year 1 class. The proportion of pupils with learning difficulties and/or disabilities is below average, but is higher than this in some year groups. Most pupils are from White British backgrounds. The school holds Healthy School, Activemark and Artsmark awards.

### Overall effectiveness of the school

#### Grade: 1

Sutton Benger is an outstanding school. It is a welcoming school that seeks the best in all that it does. The headteacher gives an exemplary lead and has established a strongly shared vision for continued improvement. She is extremely well supported by senior colleagues and governors in providing excellent leadership and management. As a result, pupils' academic achievement and personal development are exceptionally good. Standards are high in relation to the national average. This represents outstanding achievement. The school has a distinctive and very effective ethos of learning. In all parts of the school, pupils apply themselves diligently to their own work and willingly cooperate with each other. With their academic achievement, these qualities prepare pupils extremely well for the future.

Pupils also make exceptional progress in their personal development and well-being in response to outstanding care, guidance and support. The excellent role models offered by all staff and their consistently high expectations, superbly promoted by the headteacher, underpin the exemplary teaching and learning that are evident in all parts of the school. As a result, the pupils show very positive attitudes, enjoy every aspect of school life and particularly relish the challenges presented to them. Pupils' adoption of healthy, safe living and their contributions to school and community events are also exceptionally good.

Pupils' skills are expertly developed through reflection and they have excellent opportunities to use and apply them in relevant, stimulating, practical activities, often in a real-life context. Consequently, pupils make excellent progress throughout the school in developing language, literacy, numeracy and information and communication technology (ICT) skills. This enables them to enjoy their work and become even more successful learners. The pupils' excellent behaviour and the way older pupils support younger pupils in and out of class, helping to plan investigations or as 'talking partners', for example, truly reflect the school's inclusive ethos. Whilst older pupils have a very good appreciation of multi-cultural Britain, younger pupils are not developing their awareness of cultural diversity as effectively. Many parents express their appreciation of these attributes, and typical comments include, 'There is a fantastic culture at the school where children respect each other and the staff, and the staff respect each other and the children' and 'A warm caring school in which my child is very happy'. A few parents raised concerns about future staff changes and were mindful of the difficulties these caused in the past. Inspectors understand these concerns, but judge that the school's excellent leadership strategies ensure it is very well placed to manage change successfully. Excellent self-evaluation and the successful use of challenging targets have led to significant improvements since the last inspection. The school is very well placed to continue this improvement into the future.

## **Effectiveness of the Early Years Foundation Stage**

#### Grade: 1

Children make a successful start to their school life in the Reception class. The enthusiasm of the staff in welcoming newcomers to the school lifts the aspirations of both children and their parents to think positively about what can be achieved. Children's needs are quickly assessed, and well-considered interventions make sure that differing needs are fully supported. Excellent teaching, warm relationships and encouragement enable the children to make exceptional progress in all areas of learning, but especially in becoming capable independent and cooperative learners. Standards are above those typically expected on entry to Year 1. Parents are encouraged

to work in full partnership with staff to consolidate learning, particularly in supporting their children's enjoyment of school. Leadership and management are outstanding and ensure that the very caring staff give exemplary attention to the children's welfare. The very well planned, safe indoor and outdoor areas and the way staff value and respond to the children's ideas reflect this high quality care. The curriculum has many excellent features. For example, focused teaching of words and numbers is beautifully balanced with exciting learning activities for the children to choose for themselves. These include exploring the 'wolf skin' floor in the 'Wind in the Willows forest hut' in the classroom or in 'Ratty's House' in the secure outdoor area.

## What the school should do to improve further

develop the pupils' understanding of Britain's multi-cultural society more consistently as they move up through the school.

## **Achievement and standards**

#### Grade: 1

Pupils of all abilities achieve exceptionally well in relation to their capabilities. This is because of consistently good or outstanding teaching that has a cumulative impact on their learning. Children' skills on entry generally match those expected for their age, but personal, social and emotional skills are usually higher than this. Children make excellent progress in Reception, where their independence and social skills are developed extremely well and attainment is above expectations on entry to Year 1. In response to high quality challenging teaching, the pupils continue to make excellent progress through the rest of the school. Gains are even more impressive as they use and apply their improving literacy, numeracy and ICT skills very effectively when solving problems and undertaking research and investigations. By the end of Year 6, standards are high in all aspects of English and in mathematics, science and ICT.

# Personal development and well-being

#### Grade: 1

Pupils are polite and very well-mannered and their behaviour is excellent. They enjoy school greatly and their attendance and attitudes to school are exemplary. Pupils contribute fully to the life of the school, for instance by taking responsibility for stalls during the recent 'Family Week'. Pupils also take their learning responsibilities very seriously, for example when older pupils support younger pupils as 'reading buddies'. Pupils make their views known in class 'circle time' discussions and through the school council that is currently evaluating the school's hand-washing facilities. The pupils' commitment to their own learning and their willingness to support one another are notable features which considerably enhance their progress. Older pupils have a good understanding of Britain's multi-cultural society, through links with schools in more culturally diverse areas. Other pupils' understanding is not as secure, but is satisfactory nevertheless. Pupils say they feel very safe and secure and their full participation in school life in general, including the various clubs, reflects their excellent adoption of healthy, safe lifestyles. The pupils' outstanding personal and academic achievements prepare them extremely well for the future. Systematic monitoring and support for teaching have established a precise focus on meeting pupils' needs. They are also accompanied by high, but realistic, expectations of all pupils which sustain their consistent progress through the school. The key strength of teaching evident in all classes is the extremely successful emphasis on learning for oneself, and with and from each other. The pupils really enjoy this way of learning. This was seen, for example, in Years 4 and 5 where older pupils were given responsibility for helping younger pupils to carry

out investigations of different habitats. Other typical strengths in teaching include sharp questioning, valuing pupils' ideas and responses and excellent use of resources, including outdoors. The teachers and their assistants make good use of audio-visual interactive whiteboards and desktop and laptop computers to extend pupils' enjoyment and attitudes to learning. Teachers give excellent oral feedback to pupils, and good written guidance with plentiful praise and regular information that shows pupils how to improve.

# **Quality of provision**

# Teaching and learning

#### Grade: 1

The pupils' great interest in their work and their warm empathy towards others reflect the high quality of the school's innovative curricular provision. Opportunities include outstanding extra-curricular and practical learning activities. Visits, to London, for example, and early morning sporting activities in the school's spacious grounds are enriched by the pupils' wholehearted commitment and contribute very successfully to the pupils' healthy lifestyles. Staff make full use of the school's excellent indoor and outdoor facilities to ensure that pupils learn enjoyably from 'first hand' practical enquiry. There are excellent opportunities for pupils to contribute fully to the school and local community. Close links with parents, families and the church bring significant enrichment by widening and supporting the learning opportunities provided for the pupils. For example, pupils' mathematical skills have been strengthened by parents' support of 'home learning games'. The curriculum also promotes the pupils' literacy, numeracy and ICT skills very effectively through topics which link subjects together. These include, for example, developing pupils' international and ecological awareness by considering global 'fair trade' issues.

#### **Curriculum and other activities**

#### Grade: 1

Outstanding pastoral care is accompanied by equally effective academic guidance to ensure that pupils' personal and academic needs are fully met. Staff provide a consistent and successful balance in encouraging and valuing the pupils' efforts and in challenging them to take responsibility for their own learning and to give of their best in supporting each other. Pupils are fully involved in setting targets and in evaluating their work and have a very clear view of what they they need to do next to improve. Personal support is underpinned by clearly understood rules and high expectations of good manners, behaviour and effort. In response, pupils contribute really enthusiastically, either independently or, for example, as team entrepreneurs in Years 5 and 6 planning a 'Health Tuckshop Business'. Procedures for safeguarding pupils' well-being, including care for vulnerable pupils and those with learning difficulties and/or disabilities, are very secure.

## Care, guidance and support

#### Grade: 1

The headteacher has created a very effective leadership and management team, with clear roles and responsibilities at every level. This has been a key factor in raising the quality of teaching, the curriculum and subsequently pupils' achievement. Highly skilled senior staff and very capable governors work together as a team and use their skills to best effect in targeting the right priorities to sustain the momentum of improvement. Leaders and managers implement

well-considered assessment procedures, track pupils' progress diligently and set very challenging targets to ensure that all pupils build on previous learning. The accurate identification of pupils' needs, followed by timely and very effective intervention and support and the subsequent boost to pupils' progress reflect the excellence of the school's self-evaluation. As a result, there have been marked improvements in the performance of more able pupils in mathematics by the end of Year 2 and in the quality of pupils' writing and their independent learning skills across the school. These accomplishments also show the school's excellent capacity to build on its considerable achievements into the future. The school promotes community cohesion well. It successfully raises awareness of the school, local and international aspects of community, for example during the 'Global Awareness Week'. The school has established links with schools in more urban and ethnically mixed areas and takes part in national charities. However, it recognises that bringing the national aspect of community cohesion to the same high level is 'work in progress.'
