Ofsted survey inspection programme – good practice in literacy

Thank you for your hospitality and cooperation, and that of your staff and learners, during my visit on 19 October 2009 to look at work in literacy.

The visit provided valuable information which will contribute to our national evaluation and reporting. Published reports are likely to list the names of the contributing institutions, but individual institutions will not be identified in the main text without their consent. All feedback letters will be published on the Ofsted website at the end of each half term.

The evidence used to inform the judgements included: two lesson observations; discussions with you and members of your management team; discussions with two tutors; discussions with two learners and examination of some of your literacy documentation.

## Features of good practice observed

- Aurelia Training provides a highly flexible approach to the development of learners' literacy skills and to their achievement of literacy qualifications. Tutors routinely deliver sessions in learners' workplaces and at times to fit around learners' working patterns. Training also covers a very wide geographical area, including the Midlands, Oxfordshire, Nottinghamshire and Northamptonshire, with tutors travelling to where learners are based. This provides learners with ready access to literacy support.
- Tutors provide very effective literacy support to individuals and small groups. They develop good working relationships with learners, who greatly value their patience and understanding. Learners I spoke with are very positive about their learning experiences. They reported that they have made greater progress in the development of their literacy skills with Aurelia Training than they had in many previous years of study. They

describe how they have successfully overcome significant fears about returning to learning.

■ Tutors make good use of a wide range of practical exercises to develop learners' literacy skills, which learners I spoke with enjoy and which supports their learning very well. Tutors and learners use resources which relate well to learners' work and home lives. Two tutors also usefully provide specialist dyslexia support.

## Areas for development

- We discussed the need for further development in the use of information technology to support teaching and learning in the workplace, to provide more visual resources for learners and to add greater variety to the repertoire of teaching and learning strategies tutors use with learners.
- In addition, we discussed the need for tutors to plan for greater learner involvement in sessions, which can, at times, be rather too tutor-dominated. Tutors should encourage learners to do and say more in sessions and step back a little themselves.

I hope these observations are useful as you continue to develop literacy learning in the workplace.
